• We are committed to the courageous expression of personal convictions in pursuit of fairness and justice.

• We advocate sharing information, opinions, and feelings when facing significant choices while also respecting privacy and confidentiality.

• We accept responsibility for the short- and long-term consequences for our own communication and expect the same of others.

Introduction

This report accounts the events of the UTSU Spring 2014 Elections period.

The Spring 2014 Election period held elections for UTSU Executive Committee and Board of Directors positions for the 2013/2014 term. No referenda were held during this period.

Throughout the elections, the Elections and Referenda Committee (ERC) provided valuable consultation and recommendations to the Chief Returning Officer (CRO) in regards to matters dealing with the Elections and Procedure Code and past practice. The Committee's main duties are to oversee the elections, review the rules governing elections, schedule election dates subject to Board approval, and hire elections officials.

Activities before the Voting Period

In preparation for the nomination and campaign period, and in accordance with the UTSU Elections Procedure Code, a number of tasks were completed prior to the start of the nomination and campaign periods:

- 1. Reviewing all relevant UTSU governing documents.
- 2. Preparing nomination- and election-related publicity materials for campus newspapers, including posters to be distributed on campus and on the UTSU website.
- 3. Preparing nomination packages for Executive and Board of Director candidates.
- 4. Hiring two Deputy Returning Officers (DROs) for logistical support at the St. George Campus and Mississauga Campus.
- 5. Site inspections, selection and booking of potential polling locations.
- 6. Obtaining an up-to-date voters list from the University of Toronto Office of the Vice-Provost, Students.
- 7. Arranging the renewal of the Simply Voting Online System with the University of Toronto Office of the Vice-Provost, Students.
- 8. Scheduling and logistical preparation for the All-Candidates' Meeting.
- 9. Planning and booking space for the UTSU Executive Candidates forum.
- 10. Ordering ballot boxes, voting screens and seals from Elections Canada.
- 11. Hiring poll clerks, scheduling and planning poll-clerk training sessions.
- 12. Preparing polling location kits.
- 13. Updating the UTSU website with relevant election material.
- 14. Designing ballots and determining ballot quantities and distribution.
- 15. Arranging for the rental of additional laptops.

Nominations

Nominations for the UTSU elections opened Thursday February 13, 2014 at 09:00 and closed Thursday February 24, 2012 at 17:00. Eighteen (18) Executive nomination packages were signed out, including four (4) for President, two (2) for Vice-President Equity, five (5) for Vice-President External, five for (5) Vice-President Internal & Services and two (2) for Vice-President University Affairs. Sixty-four (64) Director nomination packages were signed out. When the nomination period closed, a total of twelve (12) Executive nomination packages were returned and fifty-three (53) nomination packages were returned for the Director positions. Director packages were submitted for seventeen (17) of the eighteen (18) constituencies available. All of the submitted nomination packages were ultimately approved except for five. One individual attempting to seek election in each of the following positions failed to meet the necessary requirements to be considered candidates: Vice-President External, New College Director, Victoria College Director, Professional Faculty At-Large Director and Faculty of Law. Each were found to have an insufficient number of nominators. Three of these individuals exercised their rights for a Request to Review to the ERC. The ERC upheld the rulings of the Chief Returning Officer, the individuals were unable to stand as candidates.

Additionally, there was an issue regarding the eligibility of a member seeking nomination for candidacy for more than one position. It was initially ruled that Pierre Harfouche would not be able to seek candidacy for more than one (1) position for the current election period. Mr. Harfouche appealed the Chief Returning Officer's decision to the ERC, who upheld the ruling of the Chief Returning Officer.

A number of elections staff worked over a total of forty (40) hours verifying signatures from nomination packages. The number of candidates equalled the number of available positions for the Faculty of Architecture, Landscape and Design Director, the Faculty of Dentistry, the Faculty of Law Director, the Faculty of Medicine Director, the Faculty of Music Director, the Faculty of Nursing Director, and the Faculty of Pharmacy Director. As a result, seven (7) candidates were acclaimed, pending ratification. Eleven (11) candidates sought five (5) Executive positions, while forty-three (43) candidates prepared to vie for twenty-two (22) available director positions.

All-Candidates Meeting

The All-Candidates' Meeting was held on Sunday March 2, 2014 at 16:00 in the Hart House Music Room. Attendance was limited to candidates and candidates' authorized representatives, and all-candidates packages were distributed to all attendees. The meeting lasted approximately 1.5 hours, as the CRO reviewed the relevant sections of the Elections Procedure Code, University of Toronto and University of Toronto at Mississauga policies and the UTSU By-Laws, and discussed the role of the elections staff.

Campaigning

The campaign period opened on Monday March 3, 2014 at 09:00 and closed on the last day of voting on Friday March 14, 2014 at 15:15.

Campaign materials, including posters, flyers, buttons, stickers, t-shirts, websites, Facebook content, Twitter content, Instagram content, Renren content, Reddit content and candidate videos were submitted and approved by the CRO throughout the campaign period. During the campaign period, complaints were submitted to the Elections Office alleging violations of the Elections Procedure Code. All complaints were submitted to the Elections Office via email, some with accompanying photographic, audio and video evidence. Forty-four (44) CRO rulings were made regarding complaints submitted during the campaign period. The complaints varied, encompassing allegations of misrepresentation of fact, postering, campaign materials/campaigning in a library, campaign materials/campaigning in a residence, fair play and responsibility of campaigners/supporters. All CRO rulings are appended to this report.

Executive Candidate Forum

The CRO arranged an Executive Candidate Forum where executive candidates could present a statement to, and answer questions from, the UTSU membership. The forum was held on March 6, 2014 at the Bahen Centre Room 1130 from 18:00 –21:15. The forum was also streamed live online to allow students who could not attend to watch and listen. The event was well attended.

The CRO arranged for Susan Froom, President of the Association of Part-Time Undergraduate Students to moderate this year's forum. Speaking in a predetermined order (Vice-President External, Vice-President Equity, Vice-President University Affairs, Vice-President Internal and Services, and President), Executive candidates were given three minutes for an opening statement, 15 minutes of open questions from the floor, and one minute for closing remarks. Approximately two hundred (200) people attended the forum, while a number of individuals watched via the live online streaming.

During the Vice President External candidate opening speeches, one of the Vice-President External candidates, Luis Moreno, announced the withdrawal of his candidacy. Before the beginning of the open questions from the floor, Mr. Moreno was asked to rejoin the audience as he was no longer a candidate.

UTSU Elections at St. George Campus

Poll Locations

As a large campus spread out across downtown Toronto, the University of Toronto St. George campus presents some challenges in ensuring representative distribution of poll stations. The Election and Referenda Committee is required to consider a number of factors in allocating poll stations, including but not limited to: cost, wireless access, proximity to other poll stations, accessibility for residence and

commuter students, and student traffic. There were some last minute changes made to the polling stations.

Online Voting

Online voting was available for this election period. The online election system was created and provided by Simply Voting, a company that provides and hosts online elections. The online system was adapted to match the requirements for the spring elections.

Poll Station Materials at St. George:

The following materials were used at St. George:

- Voting screens
- Ballot boxes
- Ballot box seals
- Laptops
- Extension cords
- Envelopes
- Ballots for UTSU executives and directors
- Pens and markers
- Scissors

The polling station locations provided tables and chairs, with the exception of the Bahen centre.

Poll Clerk Training

Poll Clerk training sessions were held at the Bahen Centre, on March 4 and 5, 2014. The training sessions were two hours long and consisted of an introduction to the roles and responsibilities of the CRO and DROs, poll clerk duties and responsibilities, polling station setup and closing, online voting system, trouble-shooting and scenario role-play. During the training sessions, poll clerks were given the opportunity to complete any missing paperwork (tax forms, confidentiality agreement, etc). Polling location specifics such as expected voter turnout and considerations were expressed to the poll clerks.

Voting

Voting took place on Tuesday March 11, Wednesday March 12, and Thursday, March 13, 2014. Poll stations were open from 09:00 to 18:30, with the exception of the Faculty of Dentistry Building polling location which was opened between 09:00 to 18:00. Additionally, the Old Victoria polling location that was opened between 09:00 to 16:00 on Tuesday March 11, 2014 due to a prior booking. Thirty (30) poll clerks worked various shifts throughout the voting days. Poll clerks used the Simply Voting online system to

confirm voters' eligibility by entering their UTORids after confirming the voter's identity by checking their T-cards. Once the voter's eligibility was confirmed, poll clerks marked the voter has having voted offline using the Simply Voting system. Voters were asked to sign in and provide their name, student number, faculty/college and signature. Poll clerks were instructed to each initial every ballot as they were given out to students upon confirmation of their eligibility as voters. Poll clerks identified each voter's constituency through the Simply Voting system which indicated which ballots to give each voter. Other than some occasional delays due to slow internet connections, the Simply Voting system functioned smoothly.

If prospective voters did not have their T-Card (but knew their student number and had other photo ID) or if the prospective voter's status came up as 'ineligible' but the prospective voter believed that she/he was a full-time undergraduate student and/or a UTSU member, poll clerks were instructed to use the double envelope system.

St. George poll clerks met each morning at 08:00 at the UTSU office to collect the necessary equipment and materials from the CRO and DRO. Ballot boxes were assembled at the polling locations using Elections Canada seals, clearly marked. Poll stations were closed each day at 18:30 and ballot boxes were sealed and signed by poll clerks, the DROs and CRO.

All the ballots had been designed in house and the ballots were printed at All Solutions Printing. The ballots were delivered on Friday, March 7 where they were locked and stored in the Elections Office. The ballots were then sorted to the appropriate designated polling location box along with all the other election items.

After Mr. Moreno withdrew his candidacy for Vice President External at the Executive Forum, the ERC decided not to reprint the Vice President External ballots due to lack of time and expense. Mr. Moreno's name was removed from the Vice President External ballot online, and poll clerks were instructed to post a notice stating that Mr. Moreno was no longer a candidate.

Storage and Transportation of Ballot Boxes

At the close of each voting day, poll clerks transported the sealed ballot boxes to the University of Toronto Ombudsperson Office, where it was to be kept for safekeeping. The Ombudsperson along with the Assistant Ombudsperson facilitated access to the room through a secured key process. Only the Ombudsperson, Assistant Ombudsperson, CRO and DROs had access to the office. On March 14, 2014, poll clerks transported ballot boxes, accompanied by the CRO and DROs, from the Ombudsperson office to the UTSU office. Ballot boxes from March 14 were brought directly to the UTSU office for the count.

UTSU Elections at UTM

This section details the following: (1) poll locations; (2) poll station materials shared with UTM; (3) poster locations allotted for UTSU candidates; (4) voting; and (5) the storage and transportation of ballot boxes.

Poll Locations

As a diverse campus, the University of Toronto Mississauga campus presents some challenges in ensuring representative distribution of poll stations. The ERC is required to consider a number of factors in allocating poll stations, including but not limited to: cost, wireless access, proximity to other poll stations, accessibility for residence and commuter students, and student traffic. There were some last minute changes made to the polling stations. The Davis Building, which has been a regular polling location in the past, was unavailable due to a prior booking. Therefore, it was moved from the Davis Building and an additional polling station was booked in CCIT Building for the voting days of March 11-13, 2014. Due to the closure of the University of Toronto Mississauga Campus on Wednesday, March 12, 2014, an additional day of voting for the University of Toronto Mississauga was booked, and the Davis Building was available to host a polling location on Friday March 14, 2014.

Poll Station Materials

The following materials were used at St. George:

- Voting screens
- Ballot boxes

- Ballots for UTSU executives and directors

The UTMSU Elections Office provided tables and chairs. The materials listed above were transported by the CRO via car.

Poster Locations

Several poster locations were allotted for UTSU candidates. The locations were spread out between the CCIT Building, Instructional Building and Kaneff Centre. In contrast with St. George campus practices, postering boundaries were clearly delineated on the UTM campus map. Candidates faced demerit point assessments if they violated poster boundaries.

Voting

Once the voter's eligibility was confirmed, poll clerks marked the voter has having voted offline using the Simply Voting system. Other than some occasional delays due to slow internet connections, the Simply Voting system functioned smoothly. Voters were asked to sign in and provide their name, student number, faculty/college and signature. Poll clerks were instructed to each initial every ballot as they were given out to students upon confirmation of their eligibility as voters. Poll clerks identified each voter's constituency through the Simply Voting system which indicated which ballots to give each voter.

If prospective voters did not have their T-Card (but knew their student number and had other photo ID) or if the prospective voter's status came up as 'ineligible' but the prospective voter believed that she/he was a full-time undergraduate student and/or a UTSU member, poll clerks were instructed to use the double envelope system.

UTM Poll clerks met each morning at 08:00 with the UTMSU CRO and DRO at the campus police office to collect equipment and materials. Ballot boxes were assembled at the polling locations using Elections Canada seals, clearly marked. Poll stations were closed each day at 18:30 and ballot boxes were sealed and signed by poll clerks.

All full-time UTM and St. George students were eligible to cast ballots for UTSU executives at any UTM poll location. UTM students were not, however, eligible to vote for Director candidates.

On Wednesday, March 13, 2014, due to inclement weather, the University of Toronto Mississauga Campus was closed at 13:00 by the University of Toronto administration. As a result, all UTM polling stations were also closed at this time. The ERC ruled that voting would be made available on Friday March 14, 2014 from 10:00 to 15:00 to make up for the voting hours lost by UTM students. The CRO, in conjunction with the UTMSU CRO and DRO, was able to staff three (3) polling stations at UTM for the above voting hours. The polling stations were located in the Davis Building, CCIT Building and Instructional Building.

University of Toronto Students' Union Spring 2014 Elections Submitted by: Alex Flor, Chief Returning Officer Monday, March 24, 2014

Storage and Transportation of Ballot Boxes

UTSU ballot boxes were transported to UTM Campus Police Office, located at the Davis Building as voting concluded on each day. When voting concluded on the last day of voting, all ballot boxes and polling station materials were transferred from the UTM Campus Police Office to a car by poll clerks, the UTMSU CRO, UTMSU DRO, CRO and ERC Chair, under the observation of scrutineers. The ballot boxes and polling station materials were then transported UTSU office via car by the CRO and ERC Chair.

Issues at Polling Stations

Polling stations operated smoothly aside from a few minor wifi connection issues at Bahen and Sidney Smith.

Master List Verification

Each day at the close of polls, sign-in sheets were gathered. Voters who were unable to be verified at polling stations and therefore added to the 'double envelope' list, were compiled on a list daily. This was used to produce the master list for double envelope verification.

Ballot Counting

At 17:30 after the close of voting on Friday March 14, 2014, the CRO oversaw the vote count at the UTSU office. The count was concluded at 05:00 on Saturday March 16, 2014.

Each candidate was allowed one scrutineer to be present for the count. Scrutineers were instructed to request any contested ballots to be ruled on by the CRO. Scrutineers were not allowed to touch ballots or disrupt the count. There were a total of twelve (12) scrutineers that signed in for the ballot count. Prior to the count beginning, the scrutineers were instructed that there would be five (5) counting stations, and two (2) scrutineers elected to leave the count.

Present for the vote count was the CRO as supervisor, two DROs, the Chair of the Elections and Referenda Committee, a member of the Elections and Referenda Committee, the Chair of the University of Toronto Students' Union, UTSU administrative support staff, poll clerks and scrutineers. On the main floor, ballot boxes were opened and 2-3 of the administrative staff sorted the different colour-coded ballots. Teams of three counters were set up on the main floor, there were five (5) teams overall. In each team of three, one person read the ballot result aloud while the other two recorded the result on a tally sheet, creating a double blind counting system. After each pile of ballots, the two recorders verified they had identical numbers to each other and then the team moved on to the next pile of ballots.

Spoiled Ballots

Ballots were considered spoiled if:

- No voter intent for an eligible was indicated on the ballot;
- Only one poll clerk initialled the ballot;
- No poll clerks initialled the ballot;
- Too many candidates were selected on the ballot

Double Envelope Ballots

Elections staff verified the eligibility of voters who had used the double envelope system. Double envelopes were checked against the master voters list to determine if (a) the voter was eligible; and (b) the student had not already voted using their UTORid, either in person or online. Eligible voters' ballots remained in the second, interior unmarked envelope and were sorted and counted normally in order to maintain the anonymity of the voters' choices. All ineligible ballots were separated and not counted.

Announcement of Results and Recount

On March 15, 2014, a notice was posted on the UTSU website indicating that the announcement of the unofficial election results would be posted on March 17, 2014 and that the delay was due to the CRO awaiting information from Simply Voting. The unofficial election results were posted on the UTSU website on March 17, 2014.

On March 19, 2014, an automatic recount was conducted for the Executive positions of Vice President External and Vice President University Affairs and for the St. Michael's College Director position with scrutineers present for each position. These positions were required to be recounted as the vote margins between the successful and unsuccessful candidates fell below the minimum margin requirement. The individuals deemed elected in the above positions remained unchanged after the recounts.

On March 22, 2014, a recount was conducted for the Executive positions of President, Vice President Internal & Services and Vice President Equity and for the Woodsworth Director position at the request of candidates in these ballots. All candidates for those positions were contacted and afforded an opportunity to provide scrutineers for the recounts. Three of the candidates who requested recounts for their positions failed to send a scrutineer for their recount. The individuals deemed elected in the above positions remained unchanged after the recounts.

Appeals

A number of appeals were made throughout the elections, challenging both CRO and ERC rulings (see Appendix B and C). While the CRO and all committees endeavoured to respond to complaints and

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appeals in a timely manner, the high volume of complaints and appeals caused some minor and unavoidable delays. However, all complaints and appeals were ultimately dealt with.

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Appendix A – CRO Rulings 001-044

CRO Ruling 001

Date: March 3, 2014

Time: 21:35

On March 3, 2014 at 15:28, the Chief Returning Officer (CRO) was contacted by a Mr. Theo Yan, a representative for The Varsity. Mr. Yan stated that he had been told that "Team Unite" had not had its campaign materials approved. Upon further investigation, the CRO has determined that members of a group of candidates calling themselves "Team Unite" gave Mr. Yan this information.

The information given to Mr. Yan was false and was descriptive of an unresolved situation.

Article VI.3.c "Committee Initiative" of the Elections Procedure Code states "Where the CRO or a member of the ERC [Elections and Referenda Committee] finds evidence of a violation, the ERC or CRO may charge a candidate with a violation of campaign rules."

The CRO has determined that members of "Team Unite" have violated the Elections Procedure Code.

Article VI.1.d.vii & viii "Rules for Elections: Campaigning: Fair Play" of the Elections Procedure Code states "Candidates shall campaign in accordance with the rules of Fair Play. Breaking the rules of fair play include, but are not limited to:...persistent attempts to undermine the ability of the CRO or the ERC to carry out their responsibilities; and any attempt to undermine the electoral process including:...misrepresentation of facts."

Article VI.1.f "Approval of Campaign Methods" states "All campaign tactics, material and advertisements need approval by the CRO in advance of posting or distribution."

By contacting Mr. Yan and stating that "Team Unite's" campaign materials had not been approved, despite the approvals sent via email as early as 22:02 on March 2, 2014 and as late as 13:06 on March 3, 2014, members of "Team Unite" have provided the press with false information. This is in violation of Article VI.1.d.vii & viii. As per Article VI.3.k.ii & iii, "Team Unite" has also engaged in:

Failure to follow the grievance procedures outlined in the Elections Procedure Code or Policy (maximum demerit points: 15)

Intentional misrepresentation of fact (maximum demerit points: 15)

As per Article VI.1.f and Article VI.3.k.i, by using The Varsity to spread platform information that had yet to receive approval by the Chief Returning Officer, members of "Team Unite" have engaged in:

Unapproved material (maximum demerit points: 15)

Misrepresentation of Facts (maximum demerit points: 3)

These violations are serious as they undermine members' faith in the elections. However, in recognition that these violations have occurred on the first day of campaigning the CRO is issuing the following demerit points:

On March 3, 2014 at 13:32, the Chief Returning Officer (CRO) received a complaint that Vice-President University Affairs Candidate Zijian Yang, had violated the Elections Procedure Code by misrepresenting the powers of the Vice-President University Affairs. The complaint cites a poster of the candidate posted on Facebook in which a platform point states 'Advocate for the elimination of winter'.

Upon investigation, the CRO has determined that Zijian Yang has violated the Elections Procedure Code.

Article VI.1.d.viii "Rules for Elections: Campaigning: Fair Play" of the Elections Procedure Codes states "Candidates shall campaign in accordance with the rules of Fair Play. Breaking the rules of fair play include, but are not limited to: ...misrepresentation of facts."

Article VI.1.f "Approval of Campaign Methods" states "All campaign tactics, material and advertisements need approval by the CRO in advance of posting or distribution."

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By making public a poster with unapproved content which goes beyond the powers of the Vice President University Affairs, Zijian has engaged in:

Misrepresentation of Facts (maximum demerit points: 3)

Unapproved material (maximum demerit points: 15)

The CRO is issuing the following demerit points:

CRO Ruling 003

Date: March 5, 2014

Time: 21:45

On March 3, 2014 at 23:08, the Chief Returning Officer (CRO) received a complaint that "UofT Voice" had violated the Elections Procedure Code. The complainant alleged that the "UofT Voice" platform contained a misrepresentation of fact. The complaint alleges that the "UofT Voice" platform point "Advocate for removal of \$750 international student fee introduced by the provincial government" is false on the basis that the fee was not introduced by the provincial government and is in violation of Article VI.1.d "Fair Play".

Upon investigation, the CRO has determined that "UofT Voice" has not violated the Elections Procedure Code.

According to the Ontario Budget 2012:

"The [Ministry of Training, Colleges, and Universities] has identified a reduction in indirect support, through operating grants that the government provides to non-PhD international students, as well as the elimination of subsidies for non-PhD international students provided to institutions to pay for municipal taxation in lieu of property taxes."

The International Student Recovery Fee is a reduction in per-student funding from the provincial government for each non-PhD international student. The fee is realized as a \$750 reduction in the operating grant of each University in Ontario.

The University of Toronto describes the fee as an "International Student Recovery charge" in Planning & Budget documents.

No demerit points will be issued for this complaint.

CRO Ruling 004

Date: March 5, 2014

Time: 23:00

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On March 3, 2014 at 23:08, the Chief Returning Officer (CRO) received a complaint that "UofT Voice" had violated the Elections Procedure Code. The complainant alleged that the "Victory" section of the "UofT Voice" website contained a misrepresentation of fact. The complaint cites that the statement "This past summer, our Vice-President Equity candidate Najiba Ali Sardar co-launched the "I HEART Transit" campaign in Toronto" is false and in violation of Article VI.1.d "Fair Play".

Upon investigation, the CRO has determined that neither "UofT Voice" nor Ms. Sardar violated Article VI.1.d of the Elections Procedure Code. Najiba Ali Sardar has been confirmed as co-launching the "I HEART Transit" campaign taking place over summer 2013, and thus this is not a misrepresentation of fact.

No demerit points will be issued for this complaint.

CRO Ruling 005

Date: March 6, 2014

Time: 00:15

On March 4, 2014 at 00:23, the Chief Returning Officer (CRO) received a complaint that "UofT Voice" had violated the Elections Procedure Code. The complainant alleged that posters on the "UofT Voice" Facebook page contain similar features to that of the current University of Toronto Students' Union (UTSU) logo and the former UTSU website. The complainant reasons that this resemblance gives "UofT Voice" an unfair advantage in the election.

The CRO investigated and determined that there was no violation of the Elections Procedure Code. As the use of a speech bubble in design is commonplace and the poster and website design of "UofT Voice" is materially different in design, use and configuration from that of the UTSU, and therefore unlikely to create an unfair advantage.

No demerit points will be issued for this complaint.

CRO Ruling 006

Date: March 7, 2014

Time: 19:30

On March 5, 2014 at 20:32, the Chief Returning Officer (CRO) received a complaint that "UofT Voice" had violated Articles VI.1.i.viii "Candidate Posters and Campaign Materials", VI.1.s.iii "Campaigning During Voting Period", and VI.1.s.i "Campaigning During Voting Period" of the Elections Procedure Code. The complainant provided photographic evidence of the alleged violations regarding posters located in E.J. Pratt Library and St. Hilda's Residence.

Upon investigation, the CRO has determined that "UofT Voice" has not violated the Elections Procedure Code.

Article VI.1.i.viii "Candidate Posters and Campaign Materials" of the Elections Procedure Code states that "No Candidate may post one of their posters within one (1) foot (30.5 cm) of another one of their own posters."

Article VI.1.s.iii "Campaigning During Voting Period" of the Elections Procedure Code states "Campaigning and campaign materials are not allowed within six (6) metres of a Library."

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Article VI.1.s.i "Campaigning During Voting Period" of the Elections Procedure Code states "Campaigning is not allowed within six (6) metres of a student residence."

Upon investigation, the CRO has determined there was no violation of the Elections Procedure Code. At the time of complaint, no poster in E.J. Pratt demonstrated a violation, as each of "UofT Voice" candidates' posters was located well beyond the one-foot minimum. A violation of Articles VI.1.s.iii and VI.1.s.i is not possible as the voting period has not yet begun.

No demerit points will be issued for this complaint.

CRO Ruling 007

Date: March 7, 2014

Time: 20:10

On March 6, 2014 at 00:52, the Chief Returning Officer (CRO) received a complaint that "UofT Voice", had violated the Elections Procedure Code. The complainant alleged that the "UofT Voice" Facebook page contained a misrepresentation of fact. The complaint cites that the statement "This year, many of our team's members worked on Homecoming 2013. Next year, we are committed to working with our colleges, faculties and clubs to make it even bigger" is false and in violation in violation of Article VI.1.d.iv.3 "Fair Play".

Upon investigation, the CRO has determined that "UofT Voice" has not violated the Elections Procedure Code. Some of the candidates did take part in the planning and execution of the event. As the term "many" is subjective and it is difficult to rule on whether the number of candidates who did work on Homecoming 2013 event satisfies the use of the term, a change in phrasing is suggested to better reflect participation of "UofT Voice" in the event.

No demerit points will be issued for this complaint.

CRO Ruling 008

Date: March 7, 2014

On March 6, 2014 at 3:44, the Chief Returning Officer (CRO) received a complaint that Presidential candidate Ye Huang and University College Director candidate Eric Schwenger had violated the violated Articles Article VI.1.d.v "Fair Play", and VI.1.i.vii "Candidate Posters and Campaign Materials" of the Elections Procedure Code. The complainant alleged that candidates Ye Huang and Eric Schwenger or one of their Non-Arm's-Length Parties had moved campaign materials of opposing candidates in violation of Articles VI.1.d.v "Fair Play" and VI.1.i.vii "Candidate Posters and Campaign Materials" of the Elections Procedure Code. The complainant provided photographic evidence of the alleged violations regarding posters located in the University College Residence.

Upon investigation, the CRO has determined that neither Mr. Schwenger nor Mr. Huang have violated the Elections Procedure Code.

Article VI.1.d.v "Fair Play" of the Elections Procedure Code states "Candidates shall campaign in accordance with the rules of Fair Play."

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Article VI.1.i.vii "Candidate Posters and Campaign Materials" of the Elections Procedure Code states "No Candidate's poster may overlap another Candidate's poster."

The CRO has investigated and determined that there is insufficient evidence to find a violation of Articles VI.1.d.v and VI.1.i.vii. Though some candidates posters overlapped others, there is insufficient evidence to determine that the campaign materials were moved by Mr. Schwenger, Mr. Huang or a non-arm's length party of either of these candidates, specifically.

Candidates are reminded that such behaviour is not in the spirit of the elections and will not be tolerated.

No demerit points will be issued for this complaint.

CRO Ruling 009

Date: March 7, 2014

Time: 20:20

On March 6, 2014 at 11:30, the Chief Returning Officer (CRO) received a complaint that Presidential candidate Ye Huang had violated Article VI.1.d.viii (3) "Fair Play" of the Elections Procedure Code. The complainant alleged that the candidate had violated the Elections Procedure Code by misrepresenting the powers of the President. The complaint cites the candidate"s posters in which a platform point states "You want to drop your lowest grade. I can make that happen."

Article VI.1.d.v "Fair Play" of the Elections Procedure Code "Candidates shall campaign in accordance with the rules of Fair Play. Breaking the rules of fair play include, but are not limited to: ...misrepresentation of facts."

Upon investigation, the CRO has determined that Ye Huang has not violated the Elections Procedure Code. The language used on the poster speaks to a promise being made to work towards the ability to drop one's lowest grade, rather than the ability to do so, as a power of the President.

No demerit points will be issued for this complaint.

CRO Ruling 010

Date: March 10, 2014

Time: 16:30

On March 8, 2014 at 16:42, the Chief Returning Officer (CRO) received a complaint that Vice President Equity candidate Najiba Ali Sardar had violated the Elections Procedure Code. The complainant alleged that the candidate had placed a campaign poster over another candidate's poster in violation of Article VI.1.i.vii "Candidate Posters and Campaign Materials" of the Elections Procedure Code. The complainant provided photographic evidence of the alleged violation regarding posters located in the Goldring Centre.

Upon investigation, the CRO has determined that Najiba Ali Sardar has not violated the Elections Procedure Code.

Article VI.1.i.vii "Candidate Posters and Campaign" of the Elections Procedure Code states "No Candidate's poster may overlap another Candidate's poster."

The CRO has investigated and determined that there is insufficient evidence to find a violation of Article VI.1.i.vii. While the CRO acknowledges that the candidate's poster overlaps another, there is insufficient

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evidence to determine that Ms. Ali Sardar or a non-arm's length party of Ms. Ali Sardar moved the campaign materials, specifically.

Candidates are reminded that such behaviour is not in the spirit of the elections and will not be tolerated.

No demerit points will be issued for this complaint.

CRO Ruling 011

Date: March 11, 2014

Time: 20:30

On March 9, 2014 at 20:50, the Chief Returning Officer (CRO) received a complaint that Faculty of Engineering candidate Abhi Amalsadia had violated the Elections Procedure Code. The complainant alleged that the candidate Abhi Amalsadia had violated the Code by posting posters lacking stamps indicating CRO approval. The complainant provided photographic evidence of the alleged violations regarding posters located in the Sanford Fleming and Galbraith buildings.

Article VI.1.f "Adherence to Existing Policy" of the Elections Procedure Code states "All campaign tactics, material and advertisements need approval by the CRO in advance of posting or distribution."

The CRO has investigated and determined that there is sufficient evidence to find a violation of Article VI.1.f. There were multiple posters missing the stamps indicating CRO approval for physical materials, indicating that it was not an oversight during stamping.

By posting a poster lacking the stamp indicating CRO approval, Mr. Amalsadia has engaged in:

Unapproved material (maximum demerit points: 15)

In light of the fact that the CRO was contacted in regards to the unapproved posters by a non-arms' length party of Mr. Amalsadia prior to investigation and was co-operative in removing the posters lacking the stamp, in addition to the fact that Mr. Amalsadia's posters were reprints rather than new unapproved material, the CRO is issuing the following demerit points.

The complainant alleged that in a "UofT Voice" video, a volunteer states: "I'm currently volunteering with the UTSU", while the subtitle related to the volunteer states: "I'm currently volunteering with UofT Voice". The complainant alleged that the video creates an association between "UofT Voice" and UTSU and is a misrepresentation of fact, as the individual is a volunteer for "UofT Voice" and not the UTSU. The complainant alleged that the association with the current UTSU gives "UofT Voice" an unfair advantage.

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Article VI.1.d.v "Fair Play" of the Elections Procedure Code states that "Candidates shall campaign in accordance with the rules of Fair Play. Breaking the rules of fair play include, but are not limited to: ...misrepresentation of facts."

Upon investigation, the CRO has determined that "UofT Voice" has not violated the Elections Procedure Code. The volunteer named in the complaint is both a volunteer with the current UTSU, as well as a volunteer with the "UofT Voice" campaign. The CRO further rules that association established through the volunteer in question is not an unfair advantage as other candidates may also recruit volunteers involved in the UTSU.

No demerit points will be issued for this complaint.

The complainant provided photographic evidence of the alleged violation.

Article VI.1.i.vii "Candidate Posters and Campaign Materials" of the Elections Procedure Code states "No Candidate's poster may overlap another Candidate's poster."

The CRO has investigated and determined that there is sufficient evidence to find a violation of Article VI.1.i.vii. The candidate or a non-arms' length party acting on behalf of the candidate posted the material over another candidate's poster and in doing so obscured the other candidate's platform and a substantial part of the poster.

By posting a poster over that of another candidate, Mr. Huang has engaged in:

Materials displayed in an unauthorized area (maximum demerit points: 5)

Ms. Li's poster was placed on top of this poster.

The complainant further alleged that a campaign material of "UofT Voice" was placed within six metres of a polling station during a voting day, in violation of Article VI.n.ii "Campaign Restrictions on Polling Stations".

Article VI.n "Campaign Restrictions on Polling Stations" of the EPC states "No campaign materials shall be placed within six (6) metres of a polling station during voting days", and "No campaign materials may be clearly visible from the polling station".

The CRO has investigated and determined that there is insufficient evidence to find a violation of Articles VI.n.ii or VI.n.iii. There were no campaign materials clearly visible from the polling station. Members of "UofT Voice" did not place campaign materials within six (6) metres of a polling station.

Ms. Yin claimed that the UTSU has no report indicating where funds are spent. The CRO has investigated and found that there is an audit report on the UTSU website as well as budgets. This is in violation of VI.1.d.viii.3 and is both intentional and gross misrepresentation of fact.

Ms. Yin claimed that the UTSU's largest expense is Executive salaries. The CRO has investigated and found that this false. This is in violation of VI.1.d.viii.3 and is an intentional misrepresentation of fact.

Ms. Yin claimed that the UTSU allowed the University of Toronto Mississauga to leave the organization in the past and divert fees to UTM. The CRO has investigated and found that this is false. This is in violation of VI.1.d.viii.3 and is a misrepresentation of fact.

Ms. Yin claimed that the UTSU is preventing autonomous organizations from "leaving" the UTSU by citing UTSU bylaws. The CRO has investigated and found that this is false. This is in violation of VI.1.d.viii.3 and is a misrepresentation of fact.

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Ms. Yin claimed that a Student Society Summit was created to investigate undemocratic UTSU bylaws. The CRO has investigated and found that this is false. This is in violation of VI.1.d.viii.3 and is a misrepresentation of fact.

There is a concern that this false information has been presented to multiple students multiple times, deceiving potential voters to secure votes.

While the CRO acknowledges the presence of "UofT Voice" campaign materials, there is no evidence to indicate that the materials were brought into and distributed in the library by members of "UofT Voice" or by a non-arms' length party.

No demerit points will be issued for this complaint.

CRO Ruling 035

On March 15, 2014 at 17:09, the Chief Returning Officer (CRO) received a complaint that the operation of a polling station in the Davis Building at University of Toronto Mississauga on March 14, 2014 from 10am-3pm contravened the Elections Procedure Code. The complainant went on to allege that member of "UofTVoice" were aware of this information prior to the general public being made prior to this information, giving "UofTVoice" an advantage. The complainant contended that in respect of the above, all the votes from the Davis Building should be disposed of and not counted towards the results.

Article IV.1.j. "The Elections and Referenda Committee" of the Elections Procedure Code states "... To ensure a fair and equal distribution of polling stations, locations shall be ratified by the Elections and Referenda Committee on recommendation of the CRO in consultation with the ERC Chair. In allocating polling stations, the ERC will consider factors including, but not limited to, cost, logistics, proximity to other polling stations, accessibility, traffic, and poll locations in previous elections.

Article IV.1.j. "The Elections and Referenda Committee" of the Elections Procedure Code states "Polling locations shall be publicized at the start of the campaign period."

Upon investigation, the CRO has determined that there has been no violation of the Elections Procedure Code. The CRO acknowledges that the original polling stations for University of Toronto Mississauga did not include the Davis Building. However, the Davis Building had been ratified as a polling location by the ERC on January 8, 2014, and was not used on March 11-13, 2014 due to a prior booking. Additionally, it was at the request of UTM students the polling station was moved to the Davis Building on the morning of the final day of voting. Finally, due to the scheduling of an ancillary day of voting to accommodate for the closure of University of Toronto Mississauga on March 12, 2014 as a result of weather conditions, it was deemed necessary to accommodate the students' needs in this respect.

Upon investigation, the CRO has determined that members of "UofTVoice" were not informed of the polling station in Davis prior to the general public. Members of "UofTVoice" were at the University of

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Toronto Mississauga campus well in advance of the polls opening at 10:00 and saw the polling stations being set up at the same time as the general public.

The CRO has decided that the above issues are not sufficient reason to dispose of the votes from the Davis Building, in that to do so would disenfranchise University of Toronto Mississauga voters and would not contribute to a fair election for the entire constituency of the University of Toronto Students' Union.

On March 16, 2014 at 14:21, the Chief Returning Officer (CRO) received a complaint that "UofT Voice" had violated the Elections Procedure Code. The complaint alleged that "UofT Voice" still had a picture up on their website claiming Candi Chin-Sang was their University College Board of Director Candidate, and that by not removing the poster in 2 weeks, "UofT Voice" was committing a misrepresentation of the composition of their team. Further the complainant alleged that by keeping the picture & platform of Ms. Chin-Sang, "UofT Voice" was further misrepresenting that Ms. Chin-Sang's platform points were still a part of the goals of "UofT Voice" in violation of Article VI.1.d.v "Fair Play" of the Elections Procedure Code.

Article VI.1.d.v "Fair Play" of the Elections Procedure Code states that "Candidates shall campaign in accordance with the rules of Fair Play. Breaking the rules of fair play include, but are not limited to: ...misrepresentation of facts."

Upon investigation, the CRO has determined that there is insufficient evidence that "UofT Voice" has violated Article VI.1.d.v. Ms. Chin-Sang did not officially give notice to the CRO of the withdrawal of her candidacy until Monday, March 11, 2014, and additionally did not inform "UofT Voice" or make any contact with "UofT Voice" in regards to this matter. While the CRO acknowledges that Ms. Chin-Sang's picture remained on the website, this material had been approved well in advance of her withdrawal, and it stands that it would be Ms. Chin-Sang's responsibility to contact "UofT Voice" in regards to removing social media material displaying her as a candidate. Additionally, there is insufficient evidence to rule that Ms. Chin-Sang's platform was no longer a part of "UofT Voice"'s goals though Ms. Chin-Sang was no longer a part of "UofT Voice".

No demerit points will be issued for this complaint.

On March 16, 2014 at 14:13, the Chief Returning Officer (CRO) received a complaint that Team Unite had violated the Elections Procedure Code. The complaint alleged that Team Unite, particularly the Executive candidates, had misrepresented that the Professional Faculty At-Large Candidate, Andi Musa, was a part of Team Unite, in violation of Article VI.1.d.v "Fair Play" of the Elections Procedure Code. The complainant alleged that this misled some members from the Engineering constituency to vote for Team Unite.

While the CRO acknowledges that Team Unite promoted Mr. Musa as an independent candidate, there is insufficient evidence to demonstrate that Team Unite attempted to capitalize on Mr. Musa's independent status to garner more votes.

- 1) That all scrutineers were given the same instructions and access to scrutineer the online and paper ballots.
- 2) That the count included scrutineers for all candidates.
- 3) That the count included scrutineers, elections staff, as wells as the CRO and DROs.

The complainant alleged that the above were misrepresentations on the basis that:

- 1) That the scrutineers had not had access to scrutineer the online ballots.
- 2) That the count did not include scrutineers for all candidates, and further that only five scrutineers from each 'team' were allowed in the room.
- 3) That the room included other people beyond the elections staff, CROs and DROs.

Article VI.1.d.v "Fair Play" of the Elections Procedure Code states that "Candidates shall campaign in accordance with the rules of Fair Play. Breaking the rules of fair play include, but are not limited to: ...misrepresentation of facts."

Upon investigation, the CRO has determined that Mr. Scott as a non-arm's-length party of "UofT Voice" has not violated the Elections Procedure Code. The statement that all scrutineers were given the same access to scrutinize the online ballot is correct. The statement of the count, rather than the room, including scrutineers, elections staff as well as the CROs and DROs is correct as it was only these people who participated in the counting process. The statement in regards to the count including scrutineers for all candidates is not correct, but whether this can be attributed to Mr. Scott or the article's parsing is unclear. Further, the allegation by complainant that only five scrutineers from each 'team' were allowed in the room is incorrect as one of the 'teams' elected to send some scrutineers home prior to the count beginning.

No demerit points will be awarded for this complaint.

On February 23, 2014, Mr. Harfouche submitted an appeal to the Elections & Referenda Committee on the grounds that there is no rule that prevents an individual from seeking candidacy or election to multiple positions on the Board of Directors.

The Elections & Referenda Committee has reviewed the appeal and has resolved to uphold the ruling of the Chief Returning Officer. The Elections & Referenda Committee relies on Article VI.3.a.iii, which states, "The Chief Returning Officer and the Elections & Referenda Committee both have the power to make decisions about issues and events not covered by this Code."

The Elections and Referenda Committee has denied the appeal. Mr. Harfouche will not be permitted to seek candidacy or election for more than one (1) position.

ERC Ruling 002

On March 2, 2014 the Chief Returning Officer ruled that Wenjun Lu did not meet the requirements for candidacy in the election.

On March 2, 2014, Ms. Lu requested that the Elections and Referenda Committee review the decision.

The Committee has upheld the ruling of the Chief Returning Officer. Ms. Lu has not met the requirements for candidacy in the election.

The Committee has upheld the ruling of the Chief Returning Officer. Mr. Lee has not met the requirements for candidacy in the election.

ERC Ruling 005

Date: March 5, 2014

On March 5 at 17:36, Vice-President Vice-President University Affairs Candidate Zijian Yang appealed CRO Ruling 002 to the Elections and Referenda Committee (ERC). Mr. Yang was assigned 3 demerit points in the ruling for violating Articles VI.1.d.viii "Fair Play" and VI.1.f "Approval of Campaign material" of the Elections Procedure Code.

The ERC allowed Mr. Yang's representative to make an appeal on his behalf. The appellant requested that the demerit points assigned be reduced to 0 based on the following argument:

- The appellant produced an email wherein a poster for Mr. Yang that contained the platform point "Advocate for the elimination of winter" was approved by the Chief Returning Officer (CRO).
- The appellant produced a subsequent email wherein an updated poster for Mr. Yang containing the platform point "Advocate for the elimination of winter residence fees" was approved by the CRO. In this email, it was clarified that Mr. Yang's platform did not include an intention to advocate for the elimination of winter and that the original poster was the result of a typographical error.
- That Mr. Yang had no intention of misleading students and had unintentionally posted the poster with the typographical error on a social media platform. Mr. Yang corrected the, error as soon as he was aware it had occurred, within a matter of hours.

On the matter of unapproved material, the Committee resolved to affirm the appeal. There will be no demerit points assigned for unapproved material.

University of Toronto Students' Union Spring 2014 Elections Submitted by: Alex Flor, Chief Returning Officer Monday, March 24, 2014

On the matter of misrepresentation of fact, the Committee resolved to uphold the ruling of the CRO. Though the misrepresentation was minor and in error, the fact remains that Mr. Yang's platform does not contain an intention to advocate for the elimination of winter.

In summary,

The Committee upheld the ruling of the CRO with respect to "misrepresentation of facts".

The Committee affirmed the appeal with respect to "unapproved material". All demerit points previously assigned by the CRO were expunged by the ERC.

Mr. Bhatty was assigned 10 demerit points in the ruling for violating Articles VI.1.d.vii & viii "Fair Play" and VI.1.f "Approval of Campaign material" of the Elections Procedure Code (EPC).

The ERC allowed Mr. Bhatty and Mr. Bhatty's representative to make an appeal on his behalf. The appellant requested that the demerit points assigned for "intentional misrepresentation of fact" to be reduced to one (1) and for the demerit points assigned for "failure to follow the grievance procedure outlined in the Elections Procedure Code or Policy" based on the following argument:

- The appellant stated that his campaign manager had erroneously assumed that his poster was approved when most of "Team Unite's" campaign materials were sent approvals by 10:00 on March 3.
- The appellant stated that he then put his campaign poster online between 10:00 10:30.
- The appellant stated that he was then contacted by the Chief Returning Officer, who informed him he had received a conditional approval, and that the conditions had not been met. He stated that he was informed that his platform point to: "reallocate the millions spent on advertisements by the government to better fund jobs for youth" was misleading as it was beyond the powers of an Executive Committee member of the University of Toronto Students' Union.
- The appellant stated that he agreed with the CRO and changed the phrasing to make clear that he would lobby for the reallocation of millions spent on advertisements by the government to better fund jobs for youth.
- The appellant stated that he had no part in contacting The Varsity about the misphrasing on his poster.
- The appellant stated that he had no part in communicating to The Varsity that his team was unable to campaign.

University of Toronto Students' Union Spring 2014 Elections Submitted by: Alex Flor, Chief Returning Officer Monday, March 24, 2014

- The appellant stated that some of his teammates were frustrated that they had to wait for responses from the CRO and decided to inform The Varsity.
- The appellant stated that an individual representing him and his team contacted The Varsity on behalf of his team.
- The appellant stated that this individual overstepped his boundaries.
- The appellant stated that he was not quoted in The Varsity.

On the matter of "intentional misrepresentation of fact", the Committee resolved to uphold the ruling of the CRO, but to reduce the assigned demerit points from three (3) to two (2). Mr. Bhatty's testimony further corroborated that The Varsity was provided with false information. The Committee recognizes that Bhatty himself did not make these claims. However, he is still responsible for them, as they were made on his behalf. The Article VI.1.c of the EPC states that candidates are responsible for the actions and violations of any non-arm's-length parties.

On the matter of "failure to follow the grievance procedure outlined in the Elections Procedure Code or Policy", the Committee resolved to uphold the ruling of the CRO, but to reduce the assigned demerit points from five (5) to three (3). Mr. Bhatty's testimony further corroborated that a representative acting on his behalf had a grievance for which he contacted The Varsity instead of following the prescribed procedures. The Committee recognizes that Bhatty himself did not take this action. However, he is still responsible for them, as they were taken on his behalf. The Article VI.1.c of the EPC states that candidates are responsible for the actions and violations of any non-arm's-length parties.

In summary,

The Committee upheld the ruling of the CRO with respect to "intentional misrepresentation of facts". Demerit points previously assigned were reduced to two (2).

The Committee upheld the ruling of the CRO with respect to "failure to follow the grievance procedure outlined in the Elections Procedure Code or Policy". Demerit points previously assigned were reduced to three (3).

The ERC allowed Ms. Yin and Ms.Yin's representative to make an appeal on her behalf. The appellant requested that the demerit points assigned for "Fair Play" to be reduced based on the following argument:

- That she did not receive evidence of her violation within 24 hours.
- That she told a student that students pay a "fee" of \$345 to the UTSU, but did not refer to this as a membership fee.
- That while she said that there is "no report indicating where fees are spent", that she later stated that there is an audit report released on an annual basis.
- That while she said that Executive Committee salaries are the largest expense of the UTSU, she later corrected herself, and stated that Executive and staff salaries are the largest expense.
- That she did not claim that UTM students "left" the UTSU, but said that UTM fees were "diverted" or remitted.
- That the claim that the UTSU was preventing autonomous groups from leaving is true, and corroborated by a letter written by former UTSU President Shaun Shepherd, dated February 27, 2013.
- That the claim that the Student Societies Summit was created to investigate undemocratic bylaws was an opinion, not a fact.

The Committee reviewed the audio evidence and decided the following:

Ms. Yin misrepresented the membership fee.

Ms. Yin misrepresented the fact that the UTSU provides reports of where membership fees are spent.

Ms. Yin misrepresented the largest expense of the UTSU.

Ms. Yin claimed that UTM students "left" the UTSU.

Ms. Yin's claim that the UTSU was preventing autonomous groups from leaving is untrue, and Mr. Shepherd's letter referred to the process to alter membership fees only.

That the claim that the Student Societies Summit was created to investigate undemocratic bylaws was stated as fact, but could be an opinion understood by the membership.

On the matter of "misrepresentation of facts", the Committee resolved to uphold the ruling of the CRO. On the other matters, the Committee agreed with the CRO that there was intentional misrepresentation and gross misrepresentation of facts. The Committee did not agree that her violations were sufficient to warrant disqualification.

In summary,

The Committee reduced the amount of demerit points issued for this violation to 29.

On March 16 at 13:59, Presidential candidate Yolen Bollo-Kamara and Vice-President Internal & Services candidate Cameron Wathey appealed CRO Ruling 027 to the Elections and Referenda Committee

(ERC). Ms. Bollo-Kamara and Mr. Wathey were assigned two (2) demerit points each in the ruling for violating Article VI.1.d.v "Fair Play" of the Elections Procedure Code (EPC).

The ERC consulted with the Chief Returning Officer who stated that she agrees with the appellants that the ruling should be expunded. She stated that she misread the complaint that led to this ruling and that it was not a violation of Article VI.1.d.v "Fair Play".

The Committee affirmed the appeal with respect to "Fair Play". All demerit points previously assigned by the CRO on this matter were expunded by the ERC.

ERC Ruling 009

On March 16 at 14:24, Faculty of Engineering candidate Abhi Amalsadia appealed CRO Ruling 030 to the Elections and Referenda Committee (ERC). Mr. Amalsadia was assigned 10 demerit points in the ruling for violating Article VI.1.f "Adherence to Existing Policy" of the Elections Procedure Code (EPC).

The ERC allowed Mr. Amalsadia's representative to make an appeal on his behalf. The appellant requested that the demerit points assigned for "Adherence to Existing Policy" to be reduced based on the following argument:

• That the Mr. Amalsadia proactively contacted the Chief Returning Officer upon learning that he had accidentally posted unstamped posters.

• That the custodial staff informed Mr. Amalsadia that all posters lacking a stamp had been removed.

• That the candidate and his volunteers removed any remaining posters they could find after contacting the Chief Retuning Officer.

• That opponents of Mr. Amalsadia may have attempted to sabotage the candidate by submitting photographic evidence of unstamped posters that had been taken on the same day multiple times.

• That Mr. Amalsadia may have missed some posters because other posters had been placed on top of them.

The Committee reviewed the evidence and decided the following:

• There was no attempt to sabotage Mr. Amalsadia by submitting photos that had been taken on the same day multiple times.

• That Mr. Amalsadia should have responded to the CRO's earlier request for information regarding this matter.

• That Mr. Amalsadia's good faith action of contacting the CRO about his error should be recognized.

On the matter of "Adherence to Existing Policy", the Committee resolved to uphold the ruling of the CRO, but reduce the amount of demerit points issued.

ERC Ruling 010

Date: March 23, 2014

Time: 17:00

On March 18, 2014 at 11:13, the Elections and Referenda Committee received a request for the appeal of the unofficial results of the election of the Vice President External, pending a full recount. The appellant requested one of the following changes to be made:

- 1. That all ballots cast for the Vice-President External position at polling station that did not feature a sign informing voters that Luis Moreno had withdrawn be discarded.
- 2. That all ballots cast for Luis Moreno be assigned to Nicky Bhatty in the recount, as opposed to be counted as "spoiled".

The appellant drew attention to Mr. Moreno's withdrawal of his candidacy for the Vice President External position, and his endorsement of Mr. Bhatty on March 6, 2014 during the Executive Candidate Forum. While the appellant acknowledged that the ballots for the Vice President External position had been printed at the time of Mr. Moreno's withdrawal, the appellant suggested that instructions could and should have been given to poll clerks to cross Mr. Moreno's name off every ballot prior to handing the ballots to voters. The appellant further referenced a newspaper article stating that some polling stations were not initially equipped with these notices, so that voters were unaware that Mr. Moreno had withdrawn. The appellant suggested that due to the above, voters could not have made an informed decision. The appellant further suggested that as Mr. Moreno had endorsed Mr. Bhatty personally during the Executive Candidate Forum, all ballots mistakenly cast for him should be assigned to Mr. Bhatty and would have preferred that his supporters had voted for Mr. Bhatty initially.

Article IX "Appeal Process" states:

Appeals of Election Results

- a. Any candidate may challenge the validity of their election result in a written submission containing their reasons to the CRO within forty-eight (48) hours of the close of the voting period.
- b. The CRO, on behalf of the ERC, shall investigate any appeal and make a recommendation to the Board on the appropriate action.
- c. Upon the recommendation of the ERC, the Board may refuse to ratify any single Director election. The Board may not amend rulings of the CRO or ERC.

The Chief Returning Officer, on behalf of the Elections and Referenda Committee has investigated and the Committee makes the following statement:

1. This appeal was submitted past the forty-eight (48) hour deadline as per Article IX "Appeal Process", ss.(a) and cannot be considered. However, the Committee felt it necessary to address some of the concerns articulated by the candidate, which are found below.

2. Due to Mr. Moreno's late withdrawal, the Elections and Referenda Committee could not to reprint the Vice President External ballots to due to both expense and lack of time. Mr. Moreno's name was removed from the online ballot and the Elections and Referenda Committee resolved that notices should be placed at poll stations, and checked by the Deputy Returning Officers each day.

Each poll had a voting screen with a notice affixed inside of it. This was double-checked by elections staff each voting day. Even so, to discard ballots would deprive voters of their democratic rights.

In regards to the withdrawal of candidacy, the standard Canadian electoral procedure dictates that any votes cast for said candidate are void.

The request that all ballots indicating voter intent for Mr. Moreno be transferred to Mr. Bhatty, rather than be considered "spoiled" would additionally disenfranchise voters. There is no way to determine a voter's intent on a ballot beyond what is superficially on the ballot. A voter may have selected Mr. Moreno on the ballot for any number of reasons, including to purposefully spoil their ballot. Additionally, though Mr. Moreno endorsed Mr. Bhatty, to extrapolate that this would mean that any vote for Mr. Moreno automatically means a vote for Mr. Bhatty would also disenfranchise voters. To do so makes the assumption that all voters had notice of Mr. Moreno's endorsement and would automatically follow this endorsement rather than exercise their own decision when voting. This is an assumption that elections staff cannot make for the electorate.

In conclusion, to perform of the above requests would disenfranchise UTSU voters. Regardless of whether a voter had notice of Mr. Moreno's withdrawal, the voter has the right that their ballot and therefore their choice of candidate will not be interfered with. To change a voter's choice of candidate to another would infringe on their democratic rights.



STUDENT SOCIETIES SUMMIT

On Monday, February 10, Vice-President University Affairs Agnes So and Vice-President Equity Yolen Bollo-Kamara attended the eighth meeting of the Student Societies Summit. At this meeting, UTMSU representative Melissa Theodore announced that the UTMSU would cease participation in the Summit, and presented a letter to Summit participants. The letter detailed various concerns, including that the Summit process represents a breach of student union autonomy and unfairly excludes numerous stakeholders and general membership. The letter also stated that the UTMSU was in receipt of hundreds of petitions from its members, demanding that the UTMSU and the UTSU withdraw from the Summit.

At the February 12 meeting of the Board of Directors, there was an extensive discussion about the implications of UTMSU's withdrawal, and how the UTSU should proceed. Many Board members expressed concerns with the Summit process, and the consensus was that the UTSU should consult its membership before taking action. Vice-President University Affairs Agnes So then undertook a survey of the membership. The overwhelming response was that the UTSU should cease participation in the Summit and create a more democratic process that is autonomous from the University administration. At the Student Societies Summit meeting on Friday. March 7, Vice-President University Affairs Agnes So announcedthattheUTSUwouldnolongerparticipate, presenting a letter that referenced the results of the survey and expressed the UTSU's concerns that the process is unbalanced, undemocratic and lacks transparency. 

UNPAID INTERNSHIPS RALLY

On February 26, the UTSU participated in a rally for action on unpaid internships, hosted by Students Against Unpaid Internship Scams. The rally was held outside St. Paul's Church on Bloor, before a pre-budget consultation held by Ontario Minister of Finance Charles Sousa. There was a great turnout, despite the frigid weather. Vice-President Equity Yolen Bollo-Kamara and President Munib Sajjad were invited to speak on behalf of the Canadian Federation of Students-Ontario, and the UTSU, respectively.

Over the past year, the UTSU has worked with Students Against Unpaid Internship Scams and other groups to exert pressure on the provincial government to proactively address the proliferation of illegal and exploitative unpaid internships. Recently, Minister of Labour Yasir Naqvi, announced that unpaid interns will now be covered under the Occupational Health and Safety Act, which includes the right to refuse unsafe work. This is an important step, but the UTSU continues to advocate for changes to the Employment Standards Act that would prohibit all forms of unpaid labour, for a proactive enforcement strategy that targets employers who exploit unpaid labour, and for data collection that would trace the extent and effects of unpaid labour which targets students and youth.

SATURDAY PROGRAM SPONSORSHIP





3. EXECUTIVE REPORT

MOTION

Moved: Wathey

Seconded: Coleman

Be it resolved that the Executive Report be approved as presented (p. 7).

DISCUSSION

Executives present the executive report.

Emadi states that the Unity Ball is coming up.

Sajjad states that there was a meeting with University of Toronto President Meric Gertler. He states that the executives raised the issue of OHIP for international students and Gertler is showing interest in advocating OHIP for international students. He talks about Gertler's inaugural address. He states that next set of meetings is about student account services.

Bollo-Kamara talks about the Transitional Year Program (TYP), and how they are being forced to relocate. She states the concerns of structural changes to the program that will surface if this goes through. APUS and the UTSU are doing what they can to make sure the program continues.

Sajjad states that the next meeting with Cheryl Regehr. He thanks her for helping remove the access copyright agreement that resulted in students saving money. He states that students were refunded \$13 each this year.

So states that the UTSU has not heard back from the Provost regarding Turnitin.com.

Wathey states that the new UTSU website has been launched. He states that this project started in the summer of 2013. He states that the website is compatible, comprehensive, more accessible and easily allows users to find all sorts of documents.

The chair asks if there are any questions.

Coleman mentions the Council on Student Services (COSS) proposal, stating that he didn't realize that the fee increase votes for student services were happening so soon. He asks what happened with respect to the Transitional Year Program motion.

Bollo-Kamara states that there was long discussion whether a motion to support the Transitional Year Program to be in order. She states that it was eventually amended to be in order.

Froom states that this motion was drafted to address issues about providing space for services for Transitional Year Program students. She states that Government Council should be able to ensure that this is done. She states that the recommendation will be forwarded to Governing Council.

Bollo-Kamara states that UofT is requesting increases to student services fees through COSS.

Sajjad states that the university doesn't do much to help student services.

So states that the university has not increased their contribution to the Athletics fee since 1979.

Froom states that in the past, the administration contributed to Hart House services, but it no longer does. She states that if the students' unions were to vote against budget increases that does not mean mean there will be no budget increases. Fees can increase by the Consumer Price Index or the University Price Index.

Hudson states that the university provides zero (0) dollars to Hart House. She states that it is run through student fees and donations. She states that the athletics fee has been frozen at the amount of \$235,000 since 1979.

Krawczyk asks where the university finds money to fund these services.

Hudson states that students pay ancillary fees, which are funding the services. She states that the university is not providing as much as they should.

5. STUDENT UNION AUTONOMY

Theodore states that she presented a letter to the Student Societies Summit. She reads the letter. She states that the decision was based on a members' petition to leave the summit.

Coleman states that the most important question is whether the UTSU will leave the student society summit, and if so, what the decision will be based on?

Froom states that from APUS's point of view, there have been concerns around the Summit. She states that the discussion could have a significant impact on APUS membership. She states that APUS is a tri-campus student union and has been around for over 50 years. She states that there are concerns that the solution might involve policy changes that can affect the way APUS governs itself. She states that APUS was permitted to write submissions to the student society meeting. She states that APUS was initially allowed to have oral presentation at the summit but the Chair has subsequently denied that. She states that as rightly noted by Theodore, there are student clubs that are receiving major funding that could have major impact. She states that the number of groups that are not at the table is troubling, certainly to APUS and to its members. She states that APUS wants to know why it has been excluded from the table. She states that she can understand the concerns raised by Theodore and thank her again for opening the floor for discussion on how this should be treated.

Sandeela states that he thinks it's important that students come together to discuss things. He states that in these meetings there will be group polarization. He states that people from various groups should be able to participate. He states this should not be a discussion facilitated by the UofT administration because the UTMSU and the UTSU are separate entities.

Sajjad states that the letter is well written. He states that the UTSU should consider this step. He states that he thinks the UTSU should consult its membership on the matter. He states that throughout the process, the lack of presence of clubs and other students' unions at the Summit has been a concern.

Bollo-Kamara states that the reason why this discussion is taking place is to decide what the next steps for the UTSU should be. She states that the Board should provide direction to the Executive Committee. Bollo-Kamara also states that she and So have brought up these concerns about the summit throughout the year. She states that when concerns were raised, some Summit participants offensively suggested that So and Bollo-Kamara were unable to understand the issues. She states that all membership from various student groups should be able to participate in the conversation.

Harfouche states that the UTMSU has withdrawn from the summit, but that UTSU can continue to represent UTMSU members. He states that UTSU should make comments on behalf of the UTMSU. He states that UTMSU pulled out, but not its members students.

Froom states that she hopes the UTSU will raise about the impact the Summit will have on APUS. She states that the Summit may change how APUS is governed though APUS

has been denied a voice. She states that it is worth considering the legal aspect, as corporate law that governs both the UTSU and APUS is changing in the fall. She states that she hopes any recommendations would not put APUS in breach of federal law. She states that there is a diversity of legal entities at the table. She states that if fee diversion is recommended, fees that are required to have a level of oversight as mandated by the government will be shifted to organizations that do not have the same financial obligations to their membership. She objects to having anybody handling student fees that do not have legal requirements for financial oversight.

Ekpunobi states that the board should discuss whether the student summit functions to facilitate discussion or exclusion. He states that at the moment it is destructive in nature. He states that the Summit is creating a very negative environment. He states that the Board is composed of adults all involved in student governance. He states that as adults and as student union members, student leaders should be able to have a discussion that's civilized and intelligent without having the University act as babysitter. He states that he agrees that the union and student societies should meet and talk about issues, but he does not like the way it is currently conducted and he believes some things need to change. He states that there should be more focus on how to include more voices.

Coleman states that the other student societies are required to conduct audits. They are not publicly available, but they exist. He asks what the course of action for the Board would be. He asks what specific action should to be taken. He states that a Special General Meeting or a referendum may generate adequate input.

Harfouche states that the Summit exists to facilitate discussion. He states that the Summit is discussing the formation of the Student Commons. Harfouche states that a referendum is a good idea, even though it would mean a lot of extra work.

Bollo-Kamara states that the UTSU cannot speak for the UTMSU at the Summit. She states that the UTMSU was very clear that they do not want to speak at the Summit. She adds that it will be difficult to hold a referendum this late in the current election cycle. She states that the outcome of the Summit will be announced in a couple of months. She states that holding the referendum would be too time consuming, as the last Summit meeting is quickly approaching. Bollo-Kamara adds that the board should think about what should be done in order to consult the members in a timely fashion. She suggested holding a poll or survey.

Hudson states that the Summit does not exist because of the Student Commons. She states that a meeting between the Provost and Sajjad resulted in a unanimous decision to pause the process until December in order for cooler heads to prevail.

Bodley suggests having further discussion regarding the consultation.

Sajjad states that the Summit was started because some students believed that the UTSU would not implement online voting. He states that this was obviously false. He states that some students are being excluded from the conversation. He states that regular students who are paying tuition fees and trying to make ends meet are being left out. He states that the students' unions are being attacked. He states that this has been a very successful year. He states that the Summit endangers student autonomy.

Sandeela states that any action that is taken must be democratic. He states that the status quo is not necessarily democratic. He states that the Summit is not representative

of the entire population. Sandeela asks whether it can be said with confidence that the Summit supports democracy?

Froom states that even though she has not been at the table, she can sense from what she has heard that the Summit decision is moving beyond the scope of what was originally intended and considered appropriate. She states that the issue regarding the Student Commons should be resolved separately. She states that the Student Commons will benefit everyone at UofT. She states that there is no need of administration intervention, because any bylaw changes are the jurisdiction of the membership, by law.

Sajjad states that the administration stands to gain from this Summit. He states that they are not pleased with the government's decision on Flat Fees due to the work of the UTSU.

Sandhu introduces herself as Director of APUS. She states that she spoke personally with David Naylor about the Student Commons. She states that the administration did not want to have negative press with the Student Commons. She states that this is not the first time the university has tried to hold a Summit of this kind. She states in the past, each students' union pulled out due to the attack on their autonomy.

Bollo-Kamara states that she thinks that the university has made it clear that they believe that the UTMSU and UTSU relationship should change, regardless of the fact that UTM students have never voiced this as a request. She recognizes that the students' union must be autonomous to the students' union. She states that she is concerned that our individual members and levy groups can't participate in the conversation.

Wathey states that he will contact Board members to schedule the next meeting.

So states that the Summit discussion was excellent. She states that she believes that she should undertake a consultation via a survey. She asks whether she should make a motion. She states that action should come from the discussion.

The chair states that a motion is unnecessary as it is the duty of the Executive to consult the membership and enact the day-to-day wishes of the Board. He states that it was fairly clear that a consultation was supported.

Harfouche states that he likes the website but states that there was a motion passed at the General Meeting that there would be a feedback form and he hasn't seen it anywhere.

Hudson states that the form is on the homepage and on the contact page on the UTSU website.

Seconded: Bodley

Be it resolved that the Wednesday, February 26, 2014 Elections and Referenda Committee agenda be approved as presented.

CARRIED

3. APPEAL - ERC 001

DISCUSSION

Flor summarizes an appeal submitted by an individual seeking nomination to the Board of Directors named Pierre Harfouche. Flor states that she ruled that a candidate could not seek nomination in multiple positions. She states that candidates should decide their position before signing out a nomination package so that members are able to make informed nominations. She states that an individual running for multiple positions can be confusing. She states that running for more than one position would allow one individual to have access to more funds and would represent an unfair advantage. She states that it is established practice in Canadian elections that an individual runs for only one position. She states that it would be difficult for electoral staff to administer an election where candidates would be permitted to run for multiple positions.

MOTION

Moved: Sajjad Seconded: Warnica

Be it resolved that the decision of the Chief Returning Officer referred to in appeal ERC 001 be upheld.

DISCUSSION

Sajjad states that the individual seeking nomination has argued that there is no written rule preventing him from seeking election in multiple positions.

Flor states that Article VI.3.a.iii of the Elections Procedure Code empowers the Chief Returning Officer and the Elections and Referenda Committee to make decisions about issues not covered by the Code.

Sajjad states that he further argued that he did not have enough time to decide which position he wanted to seek nomination for, so wanted to seek nomination for each of them. Sajjad states that the notice period exceeded one month prior to the close of nominations. Sajjad states that the appellant is a current Director of the Board and has had more notice than the average student as a result.

Bodley states that he has never seen an individual seek nomination or election for more than one position and that the individual should decide.

Warnica asks if there is any precedent to rely upon for this issue.

Sajjad states that he is unsure.

Flor states that she read the Chief Returning Officer Reports for the past several years and had not come across this issue.

Bodley asks what would happen if an individual were elected to two positions.

Hudson states that it would be problematic. She states that she is unsure if that individual would be entitled to two salaries or be required to work double the number of hours.

Bodley states that this would be unfair to other candidates.

Warnica asks if the Elections Procedure Code could be changed to rectify the issue.

Flor states that perhaps that should be considered for the next election period.

CARRIED

4. VOTING LOCATIONS

MOTION

Moved: Sajjad

Seconded: Warnica

Be it resolved that the OISE poll be removed.

DISCUSSION

Sajjad states that undergraduate OISE students will be on March Break during voting. He also states that OISE building management refused to provide a location on a floor where undergraduate students had lounges or class. He states that if the Committee was to go through with the poll location secured, it would be near graduate students and that there would likely be low voter turnout.

CARRIED

5. ALL CANDIDATES MEETING

MOTION

Moved: Sajjad Seconded: Bodley

Be it resolved that the All Candidates Meeting be kept in closed session.

Be it further resolved that an offer be made to *The Varsity* that a statement can be made on their behalf.

DISCUSSION

Flor states that she received a request from an editor from the Varsity to make a statement.

Sajjad suggests that the Varsity wait outside until the meeting is done. He states that he could make a statement on their behalf. He states that this is an official meeting about the rules, and that the Committee cannot be held responsible for anything that the Varsity states to the candidates. He also states that candidates' attention should be on the rules for the meeting to meet its purpose.

Bodley states that candidates should not feel pressured at the Meeting.

CARRIED

6. EXECUTIVE CANDIDATE FORUM

DISCUSSION

Sajjad states that promotion for the forum has been happening for one week.

Flor states that she is investigating live-streaming the forum. She states that the room she chose should maximize decorum.

Sajjad states that he has confirmed Association of Part-time Undergraduate Students President Susan Froom as moderator. He further states that Ms. Froom has extensive experience with rules of procedure and debate moderation.

7. CRO RELIANCE ON PREVIOUS ELECTORAL REPORTS

DISCUSSION

Flor states that she has noticed that there are multiple references to specific problematic individuals who have acted improperly during elections in past Chief Returning Officer Reports. She asks if she should treat these individuals as though they have a clean slate, or rely on the fact that they have been reprimanded for breaking rules in the past.

Bodley states that if it an individual commits a similar offense to what they have been reprimanded for in the past, this should be taken into account in the distribution of demerit points.

Flor states that she is particularly concerned about offences concerning a breach of the rules of Fair Play.

Elections and Referenda Committee Meeting of the University of Toronto Students' Union Wednesday, February 26, 2014 • 17:00 • UTSU Office

Warnica states that it should be left discretionary. He states that a poster violation may not warrant this type of consideration, but harassment of poll clerks may.

Flor states that she will not tolerate harassment of elections staff or candidates. She states that she can be discretionary, and alert the Elections and Referenda Committee whenever the issue occurs.

The meeting is called to order at 17:27.

2. APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

MOTION

Moved: Bodley

Seconded: Warnica

Be it resolved that the Wednesday, March 5, 2014 Elections and Referenda Committee agenda be approved as presented.

CARRIED

3. APPEAL – ERC 005

DISCUSSION

Flor states that she received a complaint that Vice-President University Affairs candidate Zijian Yang had promoted that he would advocate to "eliminate winter". Flor states that she was provided photographic evidence. She states that the unapproved material was changed to the previously approved poster rapidly. She states that the approved platform point was to "advocate for the elimination of winter residence fees." Flor states that though it may have been a typographical error, it was a misrepresentation of fact.

Flor states that the unapproved material was up from 9:00 on March 3 until approximately 14:00.

Bodley asks if there was srecognition of the typographical error by the candidate.

Flor states that she was notified on February 25 that there was a typographical error in the original material that Mr. Yang sent for approval. She states that on that date, the candidate clarified that the item "eliminate winter" was not on their platform and it was a typographical error. Flor states that it was still, in her view, a misrepresentation of the platform.

Flor exits the room at 17:35.

Mr. Yang's representative, Danielle Sandhu enters the room at 17:36.

Sajjad states that Ms. Sandhu should make the case for Mr. Yang's appeal.

Sandhu states that the issue was whether or not there were unapproved materials on the Facebook page. She states that each poster was approved by the CRO. She states that posters were submitted for approval. She states that after receiving an approval, the candidate noticed an error on their poster. She states that the poster was amended with the proper poster. She then stated that the candidate received a new approval. She states that unfortunately the incorrect poster was uploaded to the Facebook page. She states that the poster was noticed very quickly and switched to reflect the true platform point. She states that Mr. Yang did not have any intention of communicating incorrect information. She states that the error was discovered and corrected on March 3. She provides email correspondence as evidence.

Ms. Sandhu exits the room at 17:50.

Warnica states that he fails to see how the material was unapproved. He states that the provided emails seem to clarify that the materials were approved.

Bodley states that he could understand removing the points for unapproved materials but keeping one demerit point for misrepresentation of fact. He states that it was an unfortunate, insignificant mistake, but a nominal amount of demerit points makes sense.

Sajjad states that he agrees. He states that it was technically misrepresentation of fact, even though it was unlikely to be intentional.

Malik states that she agrees.

MOTION

Moved: Warnica

Seconded: Bodley

Be it resolved that the demerit points issued for ruling CRO-002 with respect to "misrepresentation of fact" be upheld.

Be it further resolved that the demerit points issued for ruling CRO-002 with respect to "unapproved material" be expunged.

CARRIED

4. **APPEAL** – **ERC** 006

Flor states that she received multiple requests for approvals for Team Unite from March 2 at 20:02 and the requests continued until March 3. She states that she read and addressed requests in the order that she received them. She said that fact-checking produced minor delays. She states that she sent approvals on March 2 and continued to send approvals on March 3 prior to 9:00.

Flor states that an individual named Vipulan Vigneswaran became hostile throughout the day because he was waiting for approvals. She states that he sent multiple emails and made calls demanding to know why certain points had not been approved.

Flor states that she noticed that parts of the Team Unite platform implied that the UTSU membership fee is \$350, and further implied that the union oversees this money. She requested that the claim be adjusted to reflect that UTSU does not have control over most of this money. She states that she informed the candidates that the rest of their platform was approved. She states that she did not suggest phrasing, but requested that they amend the phrasing to make it clear that the amount was not all the jurisdiction of the UTSU.

Flor states that at 15:30, she was in a meeting with her Deputy Returning Officer and then went to the Mississauga campus to patrol. She states that during this time, Mr. Vigneswaran requested the personal telephone number of Flor from Executive Director Sandra Hudson. Hudson declined to provide the information. She states that when she arrived at home, she saw several requests from *The Varsity* and requested a statement in an extremely short time period. She states that she took a break from work at 19:00 when arriving at home. She states that when she started to work again at 21:00.

Flor states that she saw an article that suggested that she had rejected the entire platform and that she was unable to do her job. She states that she asked the reporter who provided him with the incorrect information, and he stated that "Team Unite" informed him. She states that seeing the article made her concerned about the elections. She states that she believes the article undermined her authority and the integrity of the elections. She states that the ruling was made on this basis. She states that the reason for the differential demerit points were due to the fact that three of the candidates' on Team Unite's materials were approved in their entirety. She states that they received demerit points because the reporter stated that "Team Unite" provided the erroneous information to *The Varsity*. She states that the other candidates received more demerit points because instead of dealing with their grievances through the process outlined in the Elections Procedure Code, they went to *The Varsity* in order to stir up controversy. She states that the demerit points for intentional misrepresentation of fact was for the misinformation that was promoted through *The Varsity*. She states that telling *The Varsity* that they were unable to promote their platform was false, as she had approved a majority of the materials that had been delivered to her for approval to that point.

Flor states that after she issued the demerit points, members of Team Unite apologized. An individual named Sarah Qidwai also contacted her to apologize, and stated that she would be taking over communications for the team. She informed them that *The Varsity* informed her that the misinformation was attributable to them. She states that Ye Huang stated that he was the only candidate who spoke to *The Varsity* and that he did not make any comments to undermine the CRO.

Bodley asks if they had an option to appeal her decision with respect to their platform points.

Flor states that they could have contacted Sajjad or the Elections and Referenda Committee. She states that one of the Executive Candidate's on Team Unite currently sits on the Board of Directors and should be aware of this information. She states that it is candidates' responsibility to read the Elections Procedure Code and act accordingly.

Flor states that other candidates who were not members of Team Unite also received requests to amend the language in their platform to make it more clear for the electorate, and to correct misrepresentations of fact. She states that other candidate's simply corrected the language as requested.

Sajjad asks Flor to whether or not the candidates attempted to mislead the Deputy Returning Officers by stating that all the posters were approved.

Flor states that Mr. Vigneswaran and two other individuals came to the office and insisted to the Deputy Returning Officers that the posters were approved. She states that the unapproved posters were also posted online. She states that the posters were removed as soon as she contacted the candidates to inform them that unapproved materials were posted online.

Flor exits the room at 18:10.

Nicky Bhatty's representative, Kevin Lunianga, enters the room at 18:14.

Sajjad states that Mr. Lunianga should make the case for Mr. Bhatty's appeal.

Lunianga states that Mr. Bhatty posted his poster online and then received notification that something was inaccurate on it and that he could not post it. He states that Mr. Bhatty understands that he should be issued demerit points for this infraction. Lunianga further states that Mr. Bhatty did not discuss anything with the Varsity so he should not have been allocated any demerit points for failure to follow the grievance procedures or for intentional misrepresentation of fact.

Sajjad asks when the poster was sent to the CRO for approval. He asks what process the candidate went through to seek approval.

Lunianga states that he is unsure.

Bodley asks which demerit points Bhatty is disputing.

Lunianga states that he is unsure and cannot speak to the questions being asked. He states that he will attempt to contact Mr. Bhatty to replace him.

Lunianga exits the room at 18:20.

Bhatty enters the room at 18:23.

Sajjad states that Mr. Bhatty should make the case for his appeal.

Bhatty states that he was confused as to why he received demerit points for failure to follow grievance procedures or intentional misrepresentation of fact. He states that the CRO stated that the phrasing on his poster was inappropriate. He states that he had no part in *The Varsity* interview or article. He asked that the reasons for his demerit points be clarified and justified.

Hudson states that the ERC did not issue the points and could not provide justification. She states that he should make his state for a reduction or elimination of demerit points.

Bhatty states that the CRO encouraged him to appeal when he requested justification for the demerit points he received.

Sajjad asks Bhatty to provide a timeline of events.

Bhatty states that on March 3 at approximately 10:30, Presidential candidate Ye Huang and himself posted unapproved posters online. Bhatty states that the majority of Team Unite's materials were approved by that point and that he assumed that his posters were included in the approvals that he received. He states that the CRO contacted him to let him know that his poster and Mr. Huang's posters were not approved. He states that he and Mr. Huang removed their posters as soon as they were notified to do so by the Chief Returning Officer.

Sajjad asks who his campaign manager is.

Bhatty states that Mr. Vigneswaran is his campaign manager.

Sajjad asks who went to *The Varsity* on behalf of Team Unite. He asks when Mr. Bhatty found out about *The Varsity* article.

Bhatty states that he does not remember what time he found out. He states likely around 17:00 or 18:00. He states that Mr. Vigneswaran told him that Team Unite had approached *The Varsity*. Bhatty states that the candidates were frustrated that the CRO was not responding quickly enough.

Sajjad asks if Mr. Vignesawaran acted on Mr. Bhatty's behalf by going to The Varsity.

Bhatty states that Mr. Vigneswaran was acting on Team Unite's behalf.

Sajjad asks if Vignesawaran was acting on Mr. Bhatty's behalf with respect to material approvals.

Bhatty states that Mr. Vigneswaran was acting on his behalf but that he remains unsure as to why he was provided with demerit points.

Bodley asks if Mr. Vigneswaran acts on Mr. Bhatty's behalf.

Bhatty states that Mr. Vigneswaran was acting on his behalf with respect to administrative items.

Bodley asks whether or not Mr. Vigneswaran was overstepping his boundaries.

Bhatty states that Mr. Vigneswaran was overstepping his boundaries.

Sajjad states that Mr. Huang and Bhatty had posters that had unapproved statements on them. He states that from 10:00 to 19:00, when *The Varsity* came out, there was a lot of communication with the CRO.

Bhatty states that Yang was also provided with demerit points but the rest of Team Unite was provided much less than himself and Mr. Yang.

Sajjad states that the claims of *The Varsity* are part of the issue and the fact that he did not dispute the request of the CRO through the appropriate channels were part of the issue.

Bhatty states that he was not involved with the situation involving *The Varsity* and that none of the candidates except Mr. Huang discussed the issue with *The Varsity*. He states that Mr. Vigneswaran was the only other member of Team Unite who discussed the issue with *The Varsity*.

Sajjad thanks Bhatty for attending the meeting.

Bhatty exits the meeting at 18:39.

Bodley states that Bhatty is not quoted in the article. He also states that it was his materials and Mr. Huang's materials that required amending.

Warnica states that Mr. Vignesewaran acts on Team Unite's behalf and so Bhatty is responsible for Vignesewaran's actions.

Malik states that she agrees.

Bodley states that the CRO was right to issue more than three demerit points because his poster was not approved and because *The Varsity* made false statements. He states that because he was not quoted, he would be in favour of reducing the amount of points he received.

Sajjad states that candidates should be responsible and ensure that their representatives are representing them well. But that he agrees that his demerit points should be reduced.

Bodley states that ignorance is not a defense.

Warnica states that he would be in favour of reducing the amount of points he received.

MOTION

Moved: Warnica

Seconded: Bodley

Be it resolved that the demerit points issued to Nicky Bhatty for ruling CRO-001 with respect to intentional misrepresentation of fact be reduced from 3 to 2.

Be it further resolved that the demerit points issued to Nicky Bhatty for ruling CRO-001 with respect to failure to follow grievance procedures be reduced from 5 to 3.

DISCUSSION

Bodley states that Bhatty didn't have an understanding that this article was going through. He states that for this reason, a bit of leeway should be provided, but that he should still receive points.

CARRIED

5. VANDALISM

DISCUSSION

Sajjad states that *The Varsity* called the UTSU asking what action would be taken with respect to vandalized posters found at the George Ignatieff Theatre. Sajjad states that no one in the office had knowledge of the issue. Sajjad states that he went to investigate and took photos of the issue. He states that he called the CRO who requested that he remove the posters.

Flor states that she expects that one person appears to have defaced 16 posters belonging to UofT Voice. She states that the handwriting is consistent. She states that she suspects that the person who vandalized the posters tipped off *The Varsity*, given how *The Varsity* has been intimately involved with scandals in the campaign. She states that seven of the posters have amended campaign points in offensive ways. She states that all of the materials have mustaches drawn onto the candidates' faces. She states that she alerted UofT Voice candidates that the posters were defaced and that she removed the posters. She states that she is aware that removing the posters affects their visibility, but she states that it was important to make clear that this type of vandalism is unacceptable. She asks for suggestions as how to address the issue.

Bodley suggests that a notification be posted on the website encouraging students who see posters being defaced to notify the Chief Returning Officer.

Sajjad states that there was evidence of one poster was clearly ripped down.

Warnica asks how many posters remain in the Buttery from UofT Voice.

Sajjad states that no posters remain.

Warnica asks if UofT Voice could be permitted to print more posters or increase their budget to print more posters to make up for the loss.

Flor states that this is not provided for in the Elections Procedure Code and that it may be difficult to replace so few posters. She states that printing costs increase with small quantities.

Malik asks whether or not Voice will replace the posters.

Sajjad states that it is unknown. Sajjad asks whether or not Voice has responded to the notification from the CRO.

The CRO states that they have not replied.

Malik asks whether any of the posters that were vandalized were for University College Director candidate Candi Chin-Sang.

Flor states that none of the posters belonged to Ms. Chin-Sang.

Malik asks if Flor has responded to The Varsity.

Flor states that she has not responded to *The Varsity*. Flor suggests that a statement be posted online to the membership stating that this vandalism has occurred and that it is not in the spirit of the election. She states that she will encourage the reporting of these types of incidents.

Hudson suggests that no specifics be mentioned with respect to which slate was affected. She further suggests that members be requested to respect all candidates.

Sajjad suggests that members be encouraged to engage positively with the election.

Bodley suggests that the location of the violations be kept confidential.

6. THE VARSITY

Sajjad states he is concerned about how *The Varsity* has been reporting over the course of the last few days. He asks what should be done. He states that Flor has been dealing with over 40 candidates in addition to attempting to organize events and procedures related to the election. He states that *The Varsity* is adding another level of difficulty that she is not expected to deal with.

Flor states that she has been contacted by at least five different people including the News Editor and the Editor-in-Chief. She states that she has been asked about her decisions and for inappropriate commentary. She states that she has been given very short deadlines to respond to requests. She states that she was given a deadline of one hour for a request. She states that this is unreasonable. She states that she is not a public relations staff person and that must engage in administrative work.

Flor states that after her first correspondence with *The Varsity* was misrepresented to serve a particular agenda, she contacted *The Varsity* for a correction. She states that *The Varsity* contacted her and that she was chastised for her public statement and request for correction.

Flor states that she was asked why a poll location was removed. She informed the inquirer that she was not responsible for deciding poll locations. She states that she was chastised about this. She states that she has no obligation to respond to *The Varsity* and that she is concerned about doing so in the future because it would negatively affect the elections, herself and her ability to complete her work.

She states that she was asked to provide a more personal interview. She states that she was nervous about responding and that she may decline. She states that she has a life outside of this job that is not the concern of the membership or related to the elections in any way.

Sajjad states that he has seen the requests. He states that the deadlines are short and the questions are unreasonable. He states that he is unsure what type of action can be taken. He states that it might be helpful to request that *The Varsity* reduce the amount of people requesting comment.

Flor states that she may no longer respond to The Varsity at all.

Bodley states that Flor's job is to run an election. He states that he supports her decision to refuse to respond further. He states that the initial article was dishonest and indicative of how *The Varsity* intends to carry itself throughout the election. He suggests that *The Varsity* should only receive comment from members of the Elections and Referenda Committee.

Flor states that every request that she has gotten has been forwarded to Sajjad.

Sajjad states that he would be in favour of meeting with *The Varsity* and discussing their role in the election. He states that their deadlines need to be discussed. He states that a sit-down discussion may be necessary.

Flor states that she is not expecting action and is merely providing an update.

Bodley states that he is in favour of a meeting. He states that no response should contain individual names in future. He states that all statements to *The* Varsity should be signed off as coming from the Elections and Referenda Committee.

Warnica states that he will not be available for every news request.

Sajjad asks whether or not we should sit with them once.

Bodley states yes.

Malik states that there should be a cap on how late candidates should expect a response from Flor.

Flor states that she agrees with that in theory, but that she expects that she would be publicly criticized for stating this. She states that this may not be necessary at this point, as most materials are approved. She suggests that in future, an auto-response should be implemented on the Chief Returning Officer email for the first two days.

Malik states that candidates should not expect a same-day response, especially if requests are sent late.

Sajjad states that he will put together guidelines to circulate to the Elections and Referenda Committee in advance of any meeting with *The Varsity*.

6. EXECUTIVE CANDIDATE FORUM

Sajjad explains the timeline for the Forum. He states that Association of Part-time Undergraduate Students President Susan Froom has agreed to moderate the forum. He states that Ms. Froom is well-versed in moderation and facilitation. He states that Committee members should try to attend the forum. He states that the Forum will be streamed, if possible.

7. ADJOURNMENT

CARRIED

UNIVERSITY OF TORONTO MISSISSAUGA CLOSURE 3.

DISCUSSION

Sajjad states that the University of Toronto Mississauga closed at 13:00 on March 12 due to inclement weather. He states that the UTSU was required to close the polls at 13:15 as a result. Sajjad states that Flor has approached him concerned that accommodations should be made for UTM students.

Flor states that while there is still online voting available, some students vote due to the visibility of polling stations and the opportunity to approach and ask guestions of students who are campaigning. She states that she is concerned that Mississauga students will be disenfranchised due to the early closure. She states that while this force of nature is out of the hands of the Committee, that she recommends that the Committee seriously consider making accommodations for these students.

Warnica states that he agrees.

Bodley states that the polls should be open on Friday, March 14 at the University of Toronto Mississauga for the same amount of hours as they were closed on Wednesday March, 12.

Flor states that the logistics may be very difficult and that this decision may not even be possible.

Warnica asks if votes would still be counted on Thursday, March 13 if polls were open until March 14.

Hudson states that she recommends against it. She states that it may change how people campaign or vote if there was knowledge of how the results.

Malik asks if there should be concerns about volume, given that St. George students may go to the Mississauga campus to vote en masse.

Sajjad states that this outcome is unlikely.

MOTION Moved: Warnica Seconded: Bodley

Be it resolved that paper ballot polling be extended from 10:00 – 15:00 on the Mississauga campus on Friday, March 14.

CARRIED

4. SCRUTINEERS

DISCUSSION

Flor states that she received a complaint from a scrutineer that ballots are transported using a vehicle that the scrutineer cannot travel in. She states that the system for picking up ballot boxes involves the use of a minivan and several poll clerks and elections staff for security. She states that the scrutineer suggested that all boxes be walked in a line, one by one. Flor states that this process would significantly extend the process. She states that the Ombudsman office stays open late so that elections staff can deliver the ballot boxes, but that the office needs to close as soon as possible, and that the Elections and Referenda Committee must be respectful and expedient.

Sajjad states that vehicles have always been used, given the size of the campus.

Warnica asks if scrutineers have concerns with the transport of Mississauga ballot boxes to the St. George campus for the count.

Flor states yes. She states that it may be difficult to accommodate scrutineers travelling from Mississauga to St. George.

Bodley states that there could be a principal scrutineer that represents all the candidates on a particular team who could accompany the boxes from Mississauga.

Flor states that this may be difficult and that there may be independents who want scrutineers.

Hudson states that in the past, scrutineers have been permitted to accompany the minivan taxis that transport the Mississauga boxes downtown. She states that there is typically more than one taxi required to transport all the boxes, which leaves room for scrutineers.

Warnica states that he cannot think of how to overcome the issue of a vehicle being used downtown besides permitting video surveillance.

Hudson states that this may work.

Sajjad states that an article was written stating that a poll clerk complained that she wasn't hired based on her college affiliation.

Hudson reminds committee members that they should discuss issues with respect to hiring interviews *in camera* so as not to inadvertently contravene privacy or labour law.

6. **"ROBOTEXT" ALLEGATIONS**

Flor states that some students have complained that they received unsolicited text messages from UofT Voice. She states that she is not taking media requests on the matter, as *The Varsity* seems to have made up their mind on the situation without investigation.

Sajjad states that the complainants allege that UofT Voice is sending unsolicited text messages to students.

Flor states that UofT Voice has been able to provide evidence that the students who complained signed up for the service. She states that she was able to compare the handwriting on the evidence to documents in her office written by the complainants.

Flor expresses concern that *The Varsity* is writing articles before she has a chance to rule. She states that some candidates seem to have a direct connection with *The Varsity* and are using the publication to affect the perception of how events are occurring.

1. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting is called to order at 15:52.

2. APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

MOTION

Moved: Bodley

Seconded: Warnica

Be it resolved that the Wednesday, March 15, 2014 Elections and Referenda Committee agenda be approved as presented.

CARRIED

3. APPEAL – CRO – 026

DISCUSSION

Sajjad states that that he received an appeal from Arts & Science At-Large Director candidate Kevin Lunianga regarding ruling CRO – 026. He asks that Flor detail the issue.

Flor states that she received a complaint that Mr. Lunianga was campaigning within six metres of a polling station. She states that the 6-metre mark was clearly delineated with masking tape. She states that the complainant provided clear photographic evidence.

Warnica states that the evidence seems conclusive.

Bodley states that the two demerit points that the candidate was issued seems fair.

Malik states that she agrees.

Hudson asks if Mr. Lunianga was contacted about the date of the meeting and given an opportunity to attend and present his case.

Sajjad states that he received the appeal very recently and did not have a chance to contact Mr. Lunianga prior to the meeting. He states that since the Committee seems to be in favour of upholding the ruling of the Chief Returning Officer, that the decision should be delayed until Mr. Lunianga has the ability to appear before the Committee to make the case for his appeal. He states that he will contact Mr. Lunianga to attend the next meeting.

4. APPEAL – CRO – 030

DISCUSSION

Sajjad states that that he received an appeal from Faculty of Engineering Director candidate Abhi Amalsadia regarding ruling CRO – 030. He asks that Flor detail the issue.

Flor states that she received a complaint that Mr. Amalsadia had used posters that were unstamped. She states that this was the second time she was receiving this complaint. She states that she attempted to contact the candidate as part of the investigation. She states that she did not receive a reply. She states that she issued more demerit points than she had issued to him in a previous ruling because this was his second offence. She states that the complainant provided clear photographic evidence. She states that she also investigated the location of the violation and confirmed that the complainant's allegations could be corroborated.

Warnica asks for details about the first violation Mr. Amalsadia received for this issue.

Flor states that she was contacted by UofT Voice who told her that they had accidentally posted photos of Mr. Amalsadia that were unstamped. She said that they stated that approximately 20 posters were affected. She states that she also received a complaint about the matter on the same day. She states that she requested that UofT Voice remove the posters. She states that Abhinove was issued minimal demerit points.

Warnica asks how many demerit points Mr. Amalsadia has in total.

Flor states 13.

Warnica asks how many demerit points results in the disqualification of a Director candidate.

Flor states 20.

Sajjad asks what the nature of the appeal was.

Flor states that UofT Voice is arguing that they removed all of his posters when they found out about their error the first time. They are concerned that this ruling may be the result of an attempt to sabotage the candidate. She states that they suggested that the photos may have been taken on the same date as the original photos.

Hudson states that she checked the photographic EXIF data. She states that the photos were taken on different dates.

Flor states that she did not rely on the photographic evidence. She states that she conducted a further investigation and found that some of the unstamped posters were indeed still displayed.

Warnica states that there is insufficient evidence for their appeal.

Malik states that the candidate should have replied to Flor's queries.

Bodley states that he agrees that the evidence is insufficient.

Hudson asks if Mr. Amalsadia was contacted about the date of the meeting and given an opportunity to attend and present his case.

Sajjad states that he received the appeal very recently and did not have a chance to contact Mr. Amalsadia prior to the meeting. He states that since the Committee seems to be in favour of upholding the ruling of the Chief Returning Officer, that the decision should be delayed until Mr. Amalsadia has the ability to appear before the Committee to make the case for his appeal. He states that he will contact Mr. Amalsadia to attend the next meeting.

5. APPEAL – CRO – 027

DISCUSSION

Sajjad states that that he received an appeal from Presidential candidate Yolen Bollo-Kamara and Vice-President Internal & Services candidate Cameron Wathey regarding ruling CRO – 027. He asks that Flor detail the issue.

Flor states that she received a complaint that Ms. Bollo-Kamara and Mr. Wathey may have met some of their volunteers as a result of their positions as Executive Committee members. She states that the complainant argued that this was an abuse of their position. She states that the complainants also argued that one of Ms. Bollo-Kamara and Mr. Wathey's volunteers misrepresented themself as a student. She states that the appellants are arguing that she relied on *The Varsity* to make her ruling. She states that this is false. She states that she relied on personal testimony. She states that the demerit points should be expunged. She states that upon a second reading, she misunderstood the nature of the complaint. She states that it is not unreasonable to expect that candidates may make friends in their various capacities on and off-campus and ask their friends to volunteer for them.

Bodley states that he agrees with Flor's suggestion.

Sajjad states that though the candidates were not contacted to make their case, since the Committee seems in favour of appeal, a decision could be made immediately.

MOTION

Moved: Bodley

Seconded: Sajjad

Be it resolved that the demerit points issued to Presidential candidate Yolen Bollo-Kamara and Vice-President Internal & Services candidate Cameron Wathey in ruling CRO – 027 be expunged.

CARRIED

6. **APPEAL** – **CRO** – 028

Sajjad states that that he received an appeal from Vice-President Internal & Services candidate Anna Chenchen Yin regarding ruling CRO – 028. He asks that Flor detail the issue.

Flor states that she received a complaint alleging serious violations of the Elections Procedure Code by Ms. Yin. She states that the complainant provided conclusive audio recording as evidence. She states that she investigated the legal admissibility of audio recording if Ms. Yin was unaware that she was being recorded. She states that the audio is admissible. She states that the complainant was very concerned about their anonymity. She states that she is required to keep the identity of the complainant anonymous as per the Elections Procedure Code.

She states that the appellant is claiming that the ruling is inadmissible because the CRO did not provide evidence. She states that the appellant is citing Article VI.3.0 "Evidence for Rulings" of the Elections Procedure Code (EPC). She states that Article VI.3.o.iii states, "Evidence that is used in making a ruling must be made available to any candidate that a ruling finds in violation of the code, within 24 hours of the ruling being made". She states that same section of the EPC requires her to keep the identity of the complainant secret. She states that "making evidence available" is not the same as actively providing it. She states that she has made evidence available upon request. She states that there have been no complaints about this process until this point. She states that Ms. Yin requested evidence 23 hours after receiving the ruling. She states that she received the message a few hours later. She stated that she informed Ms. Yin that she could not provide her with the evidence as she was requested to keep the complainant's identity anonymous. She states that she offered to transcribe the audio. She states that Ms. Yin refused the offer and stated that it was already past 24 hours and that she considered the ruling null and void. Ms. Flor states that the Elections Procedure Code clearly states that only the CRO and the ERC can interpret the code. She states that she did everything she could to satisfy contradicting sections in the Code.

Sajjad states that this section in the Code should be changed to be more clear.

Hudson states that clearer language would be a good idea.

Bodley states that he is unsure if the Ruling should stand due to the conflicting language.

Malik states that Flor could not have done anything different.

Warnica states that the request came in at the 23rd hour and that the CRO responded in a timely manner.

MOTION

Moved: Sajjad

Seconded: Warnica

Be it resolved that Ruling CRO – 028 be clarified as admissible.

CARRIED

Abstention: Bodley

Flor states that she suspects that the appellant will appeal the ruling's content as well. She states that the Committee should decide whether to provide the appellant with the audio recording. She provides the audio recording for the Committee.

Flor exits the room at 17:30.

Sajjad states that he would be okay with allowing Ms. Yin to hear the audio recording, as the complainant did not identify themself.

Bodley states that he agrees.

Warnica states that Yin should be provided with time to consider her appeal after listening to the audio.

Sajjad states that he agrees.

Malik states that she agrees.

Hudson suggests 15 minutes.

Warnica states that he agrees.

Sajjad states that he agrees.

Bodley states that he agrees.

Anna Chenchen Yin and her representatives, Vipulan Vigneswaran and Ye Huang enter the room at 17:35.

Sajjad states that Yin should make the case for her appeal.

Yin states that the Elections Procedure Code states that she should have received evidence within 24 hours of the ruling being made.

Sajjad states that the complainant wanted to remain anonymous and that the Chief Returning Officer was exercising caution in order to protect the identity of the complainant.

Yin states that the CRO did not respond to her within 24 hours.

Hudson asks whether the CRO did not respond to a request within 24 hours or if the CRO did not volunteer evidence within 24 hours.

Yin states that the CRO did not provide evidence within 24 hours. She states that due process was not followed and the ruling should be overturned immediately.

Sajjad asks if Yin forwarded her concerns to the CRO.

Yin states that she forwarded her concerns.

Hudson states that she will play the recording for Yin.

Yin states that she recognizes the voice and knows who the complainant is.

The meeting recesses at 18:00.

The meeting reconvenes at 18:20.

Yin states that she was given demerit points for stating that the UTSU fee was \$345. She states that this is the fee on ROSI. She states that she never claimed that it was the membership fee and never said the word membership.

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Sajjad asks why she did not adhere to the previous ruling of the CRO already addressing this issue.

Yin states that the ruling was about Mr. Ye Huang and that it was not appealed. She states that she never mentioned the word membership.

Vigneswaran states that \$345 includes all the fees collected through the UTSU.

Yin states that it does not matter where the fee is used afterward or if it is forwarded elsewhere. She states that it is fact that the fee itself is collected.

Vigneswaran states that the word "membership" was not used in the audio.

Yin states that while she said that there was no report indicating where fees were being spent, she later stated that there is an audit report released on an annual basis.

Sajjad states that the audit is on the website, and that her claim that there is no report is misleading.

Yin states that she mentioned the audit later in the audio.

Sajjad asks why she made the first claim.

Yin states that she thinks that she was caught off. She states that she meant to state that there was no report except the audited statements.

Yin states that in the recording, she claimed that UTSU's largest expense is Executive salaries, and then immediately corrected herself to state staff and Executive salaries combined were UTSU's largest expense.

Yin states that she did not say that UTM "left" the UTSU, but that she stated that they had their fees diverted or remitted to them.

Yin states that it is true that the UTSU is preventing groups from leaving the organization citing bylaws. She cites a letter written by the previous UTSU President that outlined how to change the membership fee.

Yin states that her claim that the Student Societies Summit was created to investigate undemocratic bylaws was an opinion, not fact. She states that she did not reference ore refer to official documents or reasoning.

Bodley asks if Yin spoke to any Summit members about the purpose of the Summit.

Yin states that she discussed it with Summit member Zack Meadow.

Yin, Vigneswaran and Huang exit the room at 20:00.

Sajjad states that the original ruling CRO – 001 made clear that the way that Unite represented the fee was incorrect. He states that it is not a single fee. He states that most of the fees belong to other organizations. He states that she was stating that there is \$345 collected and members do not know where it was going.

Bodley asks what the breakdown says on ROSI.

Warnica states how the fee is broken down. He states that it does not attribute \$345 in a lump sum for students.

Malik states that the breakdown for UTM students is different.

Sajjad asks how the Governing Council represents the fee.

Hudson provides Governing Council documentation stating the UTSU fee.

Warnica states that he believes that it is misrepresentation, but that she does not say specifically "membership fee". He states that there is an attempt to imply that it is a membership fee. He states that he disagrees with the severity of "gross misrepresentation of fact."

Malik states that all of Team Unite was aware that their phrasing of the fee was a misrepresentation. She states that because this has been addressed more than once that it is a problem and that the ruling should be taken seriously. She states that the first time it was in writing and that this time it is being vocalized. She states that this should be taken into account as well. She states that it seems as though Ms. Yin was trying to continue with this point, and that they were caught off guard.

Sajjad states that she was well aware that this was a violation given the first ruling and that this is clearly intentional.

Warnica states that he also believes that it is intentional at this point, though he doesn't think that it was originally intentional. He states that he does not believe that this is gross misrepresentation of fact or malicious violation of the Elections Policy.

Bodley also states that this is not gross misrepresentation.

Sajjad asks to play the recording again.

Hudson plays the recording.

Sajjad states that Yin was not cut off as she claimed when she made the claim that there was no report indicating where fees are spent. He states that she stated very clearly that there was no report on how the money was spent and continues to discuss other things. He states that she did not mention the audit in connection to the first statement.

Warnica states that he agreed that she misrepresented what she said in her appeal. He states that she did refer to the audit statement for another issue.

Malik agrees.

Bodley states that her claim that she was cut off is not substantiated by the recording.

Warnica asks if this is intentional and gross misrepresentation.

Hudson suggests that Flor be asked later.

Bodley asks if she was blatantly lying or made a poor statement.

Sajjad states that she is a commerce student. He states that she should know that this document shows where the money is being spent.

Warnica states that demerit points should be awarded for either intentional or gross misrepresentation but not both.

Sajjad states that with respect to Executive salaries being the largest expense of the UTSU, that Ms. Yin may have not meant to say only Executive at the start.

Bodley states that she clearly corrects herself and states staff and executive. He states that it may be a misrepresentation.

Malik states that it was not intentional, but it was a misrepresentation.

Sajjad states that he agrees.

Warnica states that she corrects herself immediately afterward. He states that regardless, the biggest expense is actually the health and dental plan.

Hudson agrees that she corrected herself.

Malik states that she feels as though this is intentional because she must have known having looked at the statement.

Bodley states that her statement was clearly incorrect, but he wants to discuss whether or not this is a candidate who doesn't know what she was talking about or whether or not she was intentionally deceitful.

Warnica states that he feels uncomfortable given that this contradicts the first part of the ruling, which states that UTSU receives fees of \$345 because we are including that in our expenses.

Sajjad states that it is not contradictory, because UTSU collects health and dental information that is passed through. He states that on our audit it is indeed the largest expense. He also states that it is broken down on ROSI.

Malik states that she agrees with Sajjad. She states that Yin is being misleading because the salary is not the highest expense of the funds that go toward UTSU.

Warnica asks if this is intentional or not.

Bodley states that he believes that it was unintentional.

Malik states that regardless it is misleading.

Bodley asks if the UTMSU left the UTSU.

Hudson states that the organizations amalgamated in 2007.

Bodley asks what the relationship is with UTM.

Hudson explains the relationship.

Sajjad states that the recording states that UTSU let UTM leave. He states that this is intentional misrepresentation of fact.

Malik agrees.

Warnica agrees that it is misrepresentation.

Bodley agrees.

Malik states that Ms. Yin's statement with respect to the Student Societies Summit wasn't based on fact, but on the testimony of Mr. Zack Medow, and she admitted that in her appeal.

Sajjad asked if this was her opinion or the opinion of Mr. Zack Medow.

Bodley states that her opinion was informed by consulting with certain people. He states that just because this opinion differs from what others' opinion of the Summit was, it shouldn't be disrespected.

Malik states that she wasn't exactly breaking the rules by stating her opinion.

Bodley states that bylaws have come up in the Summit. He states that there is a wide array of issues discussed. He asks whether she made it sound like a fact or opinion.

Warnica states that she says "potentially undemocratic" in the recording.

Sajjad states that the recording makes it seem as though the Student Societies Summit was created because the UTSU is undemocratic. He states that she does not make it sound like opinion. He states that the administration has a whole different reason for how the Summit was created.

Bodley states that he is not sure whether she was completely incorrect. Bodley states that the question is whether she made this seem like fact or opinion.

Warnica states that this is simply misrepresentation of fact, in which only three demerit points were awarded, so the Committee should not belabor this point.

Malik states that it would be a big jump to reduce it to 29 points, which is what would be required to overturn her disqualification.

Bodley states that he suggests three (3) for misrepresentation of fact, ten (10) for intentional misrepresentation of fact, and for malicious intent 10. He states that he believes that she should be awarded less than 29 points. He states that she never denounces the other candidates. He states that she seemed genuine and respectful. He states that she wasn't being derogatory or oppressive and she was upholding UofT values. He states that she made a lot of inaccurate statements.

Warnica states that he agrees that the points should be reduced. He states that she should not receive gross misrepresentation for \$345. He does believe that she should receive gross misrepresentation for the report.

Malik states that the gross can be reduced. She also states that most of her statements may have been mistakes and that she was potentially coached by her team. She states that 29 points is fair because it wasn't malicious or intentional for the most part.

Sajjad states that he does not want to touch the demerits but the issue itself. He states that any candidate should know what the issues are and what they are discussing. He states that it doesn't matter who is telling the candidate the wrong information, the candidate is responsible for what they say. Sajjad further states that she should be given demerit points for gross misrepresentation because she claimed things that the CRO already corrected. Sajjad states that it is difficult for him to suggest that this should be reduced to 29 points.

Warnica states that no one is in disagreement for misrepresentation of fact. He states that the Committee must discuss intentional misrepresentation of fact, gross misrepresentation of fact, intentional violation of the Elections Procedure Code or Policy and failure to comply with the spirit and purpose of the elections.

Sajjad states that gross misrepresentation of fact should be more than 10.

Bodley suggests keeping misrepresentation of facts at three (3), keeping intentional representation of facts at 10, reducing gross to 10, malicious or intentional violation to five (5) and failure to comply with the spirit and purpose of the elections to one (1).

Malik states that we are unsure if this is the only person who was told this information. She states that we do not know if she is the only person from this team is saying these things as well. She states that this is an election, and she should know what is being discussed.

Sajjad states that some of these issues have been discussed by the CRO and the ERC before. He states that to him, this is malicious. He states that this is more than one point for failure to comply with the spirit and purpose of the elections.

Malik states that dropping 15 points to five (5) for malicious violation of the Elections Procedure Code is too much.

Warnica states that disqualification is way too harsh of a punishment because there are some issues that have been ruled as more than one violation.

Bodley agrees. He states that she was respectful, but made some mistakes. He states that it is clearly misrepresentation and in some cases intentional, but he does not think that these issues should be too high.

Sajjad states that with all of these issues combined that this is failure to comply with the spirit. He states that he agrees on some level that she was intentionally trying to negatively campaign against some candidates. He states that he said in her statement that she was running against "incumbents" to and attributed her incorrect statements to them. He states that this is not positive or fair.

Bodley asks if UofT Voice talked about themselves as the incumbents. He states that if that is the case, then Unite should have been able to discuss them as incumbents as well.

Warnica states that failure to comply with the spirit and purpose of the elections should not be there at all.

Sajjad agrees.

Malik agrees.

Bodley agrees. He states that this brings her down to a total of 43 points for this complaint. He suggests reducing the other points that she was awarded to be reduced to 28.

Malik states that malicious should be higher because it was addressed in another complaint.

Warnica states if that he firmly believes that Yin should not be disqualified.

MOTION

Moved: Bodley

Seconded: Warnica

Be it resolved Anna Chenchen Yin's total demerit point count be reduced to 34.

CARRIED

Sajjad is against the motion.

6. ONLINE VOTING

MOTION

Be it resolved that the discussion continue *in camera*.

CARRIED

The discussion moved *in camera* at 21:16.

The discussion moved ex camera at 21:26.

7. APPEAL OF EXTENDED VOTING HOURS

DISCUSSION

Flor states that she received an appeal of the Committee decision to extend voting hours by Vice-President University Affairs candidate Pierre Harfouche. She states that Harfouche's appeal is based on the idea that there must be eight polling stations open at the St. George campus and three polling located at the Mississauga campus during polling. She states that given that logic, she should have discarded all of the votes at St. George when the Mississauga polls were closed. She states that Committee members should consider the cost and fairness to the electorate. She stresses that the purpose of the Elections Procedure Code is to facilitate a fair process for the membership. She states that the Code allows herself and the Committee to make changes when there are unforeseen circumstances. She states that she believes the actions of the Committee on her recommendation were justified.

Bodley states that it would be unfair to disenfranchise the hundreds of students who voted in person on March 14.

Sajjad states that a decision was made to deal with a strange, rare situation. He states that the decision was fair.

Bodley states that throwing out ballot boxes would be a huge violation of UTM students' rights.

Malik agrees.

Warnica agrees.

8. HARASSMENT OF ELECTIONS STAFF

DISCUSSION

Flor states that a number of the poll clerks felt they had been harassed and videotaped by members of Team Unite. She states that while the ballot box collection was being undertaken, she spoke to Presidential candidate Ye Huang and told him that it was unacceptable to take photos and film the poll clerks, especially when poll clerks requested that he stop doing so. She requested that photos and videos be deleted. She states that he was amenable. She states that she told him that if this was not taken care of she would escalate the situation and inform the administration.

Flor states that after the ballot boxes were brought to the transport vehicle, she saw Mr. Huang filming Sajjad, poll clerks and the UTM CRO. She said that he attempted to hide this when he saw her. Sajjad states that he informed Mr. Huang he did not want to be filmed.

Bodley asked if there was eyewitness proof.

Flor states that she saw Mr. Huang filming.

Sajjad states that it was not just Mr. Huang, but that other volunteers for Mr. Huang also recorded elections staff. He stated that he was personally recorded twice.

Bodley states that he is uncomfortable with the fact that this happened.

Flor states that it's one thing to photograph the CRO. She states that it is another thing to photograph and film the poll clerks. She states that this amounted to workplace harassment.

Bodley states that he also feels as though it is unfair and upsetting because these individuals were at work and could not leave the polls if they were uncomfortable. Bodley states that this should be pursued further and should not go unchallenged.

Flor exits the room at 18:40.

Abhi Amalsadia's representative, Danielle Sandhu, enters the room at 18:43.

Sajjad states that Ms. Sandhu should make the case for Mr. Amalsadia's appeal. Sandhu states that Amalsadia's materials were approved by the CRO, but that he had accidentally put up posters that did not have a stamp on them. Sandhu states that Amalsadia contacted the CRO once they realized their mistake. She states that Amalsadia was proactive. She states that she wants to stress that the material was approved. She states that the custodial staff removed posters that were lacking stamps and approval and informed Amaldasia's representative of this fact. She states that she is unsure how any posters could possibly remain. She states that multiple photos may have been taken and presented as complaints on different dates though they were taken at the same time. She further states that the posters may have been underneath other posters that were placed on top of them later. She states that she did not remove posters to check if his posters were underneath. She states that though he lost and the violation does not affect the outcome, that the violation adds insult to injury.

Sajjad asks if there was an attempt to remove posters in Bahen, Sanford Fleming and Galbraith.

Sandhu states that they did, and that they did not see any remaining posters when they took down their posters. She states that they would not have contacted the CRO had they had any intention of breaking the rules.

Sandhu exits the room at 18:50.

Sajjad states that he is in favour of reducing the demerit points issued for this violation.

Bodley states that points should be reduced, but there should be enough to reflect that the candidate did not respond to requests for more information from the CRO.

Be it resolved that the amount of demerit points issued for ruling CRO - 030 be reduced from 10 to five (5).

5. APPEAL – MARCH 14 VOTING DAY

Sajjad reminds the Committee that Harfouche appealed the additional voting hours on March 14 to make up for the early closure of UTM polls on Wednesday. He states that we need to decide how to communicate the ERC decision.

Bodley states that Sajjad should respond to him directly. He states that the ERC should reiterate that the UTM campus was closed on Wednesday. He states that he believes that some students may be forgetting that fact. Bodley also states that online voting complements paper ballots and does not supercede it. He states that he voted via ballot. He states that there are many people who do not want to vote online. He states that if online voting had crashed, the same concern would be addressed. He states that we cannot disenfranchise all the students that voted on Friday.

Warnica states that he agrees that Sajjad should respond to Mr. Harfouche with the ERC decision.

6. APPEAL OF RESULTS – VICE-PRESIDENT EXTERNAL

Flor states that Vice-President External candidate Nicky Bhatty has appealed the results of the Vice-President External position. He states that all the ballots that had been submitted for former Vice-President External candidate Luis Moreno should be reassigned to him. She states that she was asked why the poll clerks had not scratched out his name. She states that this could have led to a high margin of error and that a notice was placed at each polling location indicating that Mr.

Moreno forfeit as per the decision of the ERC. She states that people could have picked him purposefully to spoil. She states that there is no guarantee that supporters of Mr. Moreno would have voted for Mr. Bhatty.

Sajjad asks what the logic is behind the request that all the ballots are reassigned to him.

Warnica states that there is no way to know what the intention of the voters would have been if Moreno was not on the ballot.

Flor states that to assign all the votes from Mr. Moreno to Mr. Bhatty makes assumptions that she simply cannot accept. She also states that the appeal was too late to be considered.

Warnica states that the committee should communicate that the appeal was late and discuss the substantive issues with the appeal.

1. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 15:30.

2. APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

MOTION

Moved: Wathey

Seconded: Petrolo

Be it resolved that the March 18, 2014 Organizational Development and Services agenda be approved as presented.

CARRIED

3. HEALTH AND DENTAL PLAN

DISCUSSION

Wathey states that Hudson will provide an overview about the Health and Dental Plan.

Hudson gives an overview of the Health and Dental Plan performance in 2013-14. She states that the number one reason why students use the plan is for prescription drugs, and particularly antidepressants and oral contraceptives. She states that some students have suggested that counseling services be added to the coverage.

Hudson states that there are several options for renewal. She states that a renewal with the same coverage would result in a fee increase of just over five per cent. She states that a renewal that adds counseling services at coverage of \$30 per visit would result in a fee increase of just over six per cent. She states that a renewal that reduces the cap on the dispensing fee would result in a fee increase of just over six per cent. She states that combining all three options would result in a fee increase of just below seven per cent.

Petrolo states that students should be encouraged to make use of Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS) at the University.

Wathey states that there are issues with CAPS. He states that students have a cap on how often they can use CAPS, that the wait list is very long and that the staff can sometimes be overworked. He states that we should encourage use of CAPS, but also recognize that some students may elect to use services external to the university because of these issues. He states that he would support changing the plan to cover these services.

Brown states that there are concerns with CAPS and that the service should be improved and supported. Brown states that he would like to see if the committee could investigate a renewal

that removed the least used services so that we could include these services without an increase at all.

Petrolo states that she would like to see this information as well.

Hudson states that she will try to get the information from the Health and Dental Plan Coordinator by the deadline.

Petrolo states that she would like to see a pamphlet made to help students understand the travel insurance. She states that students who are studying abroad may need to use the service and that it is difficult to understand. She states that the fact that it is provided by a company external to Greenshield complicates it.

Wathey states that this is a great idea.

Hudson states that she will pass this request on to the Health and Dental Plan Coordinator.

4. MOBILE KIOSK

DISCUSSION

Wathey states that the Mobile Kiosk has now been shipped. He states that the Kiosk has been used a few times, before winter complicated its mobility. He states that he will be working to create a schedule for the Kiosk, and a system where UTSU services can be provided on-location. He states that he intends to prioritize East Campus and professional faculties.

Brown states that the Kiosk should prioritize Pharmacy and Dentistry because of their peripheral location to the campus.

Wathey responds in the affirmative. He states that the Kiosk will promote UTSU services. He states that he would like to provide the International Student Identity Card (ISIC) through the Kiosk, but states that this may be difficult. He states that he was able to sell out Raptors tickets this year though the use of the Kiosk.

Brown states that Health and Dental Plan information should also be distributed via the Kiosk. He asks if it would be feasible to accept claims via the Kiosk.

Wathey states that some information can be provided. He states that he is concerned about accepting official documentation with personal and private information via the Kiosk.

Brown asked how scheduling of the Kiosk worked when Wathey used it.

Wathey states that he made a schedule with his associate that prioritized East Campus and was based off of volunteers and Blue Crew availability.

5. TAX CLINICS

DISCUSSION

Wathey states that Tax Clinics are currently being set up.

Hudson states that she has been working with staff over the last two weeks to facilitate this. She states that training of Commerce student volunteers is underway. She states that there was some difficulty with the online appointment reservation system but that this has been resolved. She states that there is some difficulty connecting the Tax Clinic station to the Internet due to the way that the University's system is configured. She states that she expects these issues to be resolved on time.

Brown asks if the service is expanding, as the appointments were completely booked last year.

Hudson states that there is no space to do so in the office. She states that this was one of the goals of the Student Commons and expresses that the delay is a detriment to student services.

Wathey suggests collecting analytics to see how many students are attempting to book appointments but cannot.

Brown asks whether the Tax Clinic volunteers are trained on how to do taxes for international students.

Hudson states that she will ask the Services Coordinator. She states that the training is provided by Services Canada.

6. GOOD FOOD BOX

Wathey states that he has worked hard to expand the Good Food Box program this year. He states that the service has expanded pickup locations to Woodsworth College, the Transitional Year Program and the Athletic Centre. He states that there must be a minimum number of orders met in order for FoodShare, the company that runs the Good Food Box, to deliver to those locations.

Brown asks if the union can expand its food services.

Petrolo suggests setting up a farmer's market on campus in the summer.

Hudson states that she believes that there is a farmer's market at University College in the summer.

Wathey states that he intended to expand the hours of the Food Bank. He states that after analyzing the service, he thought that it would be unfeasible to expand the hours. Instead, he developed a system to expediate the experience for Food Bank users. There is now a number system that alleviates lineups and enables students to use the program faster. He states that there is still high demand.

Hudson states that the UofT is one of the only schools in the country to not have a food bank that runs at least five days a week. She states that students should have access to the bank more often. She states that this was one of the things that students wanted in a Student Commons.

3. HEALTH AND DENTAL PLAN FEE INCREASE

Galvez states that she was unable to get information on zero per cent rate increases and the least used items of the health and dental plan in time for the meeting. She further states that she is unable to see the claims due to privacy restrictions.

Petrolo states that this information is necessary in order to make an informed decision.

Galvez states that the insurance provider has promised to provide this information by tomorrow.

Hudson states that the company is typically unable to provide this information until late March, which is very close to the deadline to submit fee increases for approval. She further states that the Committee should make a recommendation at this point in order to fulfill notice requirements for the Board of Directors meeting, but that this motion can be amended at the meeting based on any information received tomorrow.

Petrolo asks what the fee is currently.

Galvez states that the current health and dental plan fee is \$138 per year for health and \$124.34 for dental.

Petrolo asks if the fee increases every year.

Galvez states that the fee varies due to health plan inflation and claims experience. She states that the fee has both increased, decreased and stayed constant in previous years.

Petrolo asks what the projected increase is if the plan does not change.

Galvez states that it is 5.25 per cent.

Petrolo asks if students can opt out of the plan if they have alternative coverage.

Galvez states that students can. She provides information as to how students were able to opt out.

Wathey asks what would happen if the fee was not increased.

Galvez states that the UTSU would no longer be able to afford the plan.

Hudson asks Galvez for her recommendation.

Galvez states that there should be no decrease to coverage. She further states that based on the claims experience and recommendations she has heard from plan users, she would recommend that there should be coverage for counseling as well as a removal of the copay for students who are claiming for prescription drugs.

Petrolo asks why prescription glasses are not covered.

Hudson states that this was too expensive to do in the past. She suggests trying again.

Galvez states that the Association of Part-Time Undergraduate Students and the Graduate Students' Union do provide partial coverage for prescription glasses, and that she will look into this.

Brown states that he prefers counselling services to prescription drugs when it comes to mental health services. He states that he would like to see the UTSU make recommendations to Counselling and Psychological Services.

Hudson states that recommendations have been made and a campus-wide investigation into mental health supports is ongoing. She encourages Committee members to contact Vice-President Equity Yolen Bollo-Kamara for more information.

Petrolo states that the UTSU should provide educational information to members about alternative options to anti-depressant drugs.

4. MOTION TO INCREASE OF HEALTH AND DENTAL PLAN FEE

3. BOARD RESTRUCTURE PROPOSAL

Ekpunobi states that he conducted research about 10-12 different students' unions across the country and across the world to investigate how to better structure the University of Toronto Students' Union. He states that he investigated bylaws, policies and structures. He states that it is all current information as to this year. He states that he looked at the Woodsworth College Students' Association (WCSA), the Trinity College Meeting (TCM), the University College Literary and Athletics Society (UCLIT), the Innis College Student Society (ICSS), the New College Student Council (NCSC), the St. Michael's College Students' Union (SMCSU), the Victoria University Students' Administrative Council (VUSAC), the Ryerson Students' Union (RSU), the York University Students' Union (YUSU) (UK), the Students' Federation of the University of Ottawa (SFUO), the University of British Columbia Alma Mater Society (UBCAMS), the Dalhousie Students' Union (DSU) and the Harvard Undergraduate Council (HUC).

Nzube Ekpunobi

Ekpunobi states that there is much to be learned from WCSA with respect to adding a Community Services director and an Athletics Director. He states that the NCSC has an Education director and an e-communications director that could be useful to the UTSU as well.

Kondon asks what constituency would vote for these directors.

Ekpunobi states that he is unsure. He states that they could be appointed.

Hudson states that they could all be generally elected.

Wathey explains that at SMCSU, everyone is elected at large, and the duties are assigned after the election. He states that this could be considered as well.

Ekpunobi states that YUSU has part-time officers who deal with self-identified

constituencies. He states that there is a Women's Officer and a Racialized Students' officer and he states that these would be good positions for the UTSU to consider.

Ekpunobi states that the SFUO also has an Accessibility Director. He states that the DSU also has an Aboriginal Student Representative and an International Student Representative. He states that the UTSU should consider adopting a Residence Representative. He states that students who are dedicated to an interresidence relationship would be useful. He also states that the DSU has a Sandbox Team, which is a group of students who are specifically tasked with seeking feedback from the membership. He states that this may also be a good idea.

Ekpunobi highlights his recommendations based off of his research.

Kondan states that he appreciates that the recommendations for self-identified constituency representation and that the recommendations specify that representatives should be experienced. He asks how these students could be elected.

Ekpunobi states that he is concerned that the elections would need to be limited to students who self-identified with the respective constituency. He states that these positions may need to be appointed as a result.

Hudson states that these positions could be elected from their respective Service Group. She states that they could also be elected out of a meeting of the self-identified groups at the beginning of the year, who identified what their goals should be. She states that there are several options.

Kondan states that he thinks there should be more Directors. He states that this system may eliminate college representation.

Hudson states that she has heard that some of the concern from colleges stems from the fact that they have representatives that are not elected from their Board. She states that perhaps they should be able to send their own representatives to observe and speak at our Board, and that perhaps another council that is an official part of our structure should be set up to provide direct input.

Kondan states that our board is too large currently. He states that 20 Directors may be too low. He suggests a number closer to 25.

Wathey states that the proposed at-large Arts & Science Directors could be responsible for communications with multiple college councils if there are concerns about representation.

Ekpunobi states that he agrees with Hudson.

Kondan states that there is a concern that we may lose connections with the student societies if there is not direct representation.

Wathey states that we may want to consider the athletics representative.

Kondan asks whether there should be additional international student director in order to represent how many international students there are.

Wathey states that there should likely be a first year student representative as well.

Slobodian states that she is nervous about the lack of college-based representation.

Wathey states that he will consult each college President to discuss the various proposals to try to find a solution everyone can be happy with.
