- We strive to understand and respect other communicators before evaluating and responding to their messages.
- We promote access to communication resources and opportunities as necessary to fulfill human potential and contribute to the well-being of families, communities, and society.
- We promote communication climates of caring and mutual understanding that respect the unique needs and characteristics of individual communicators.
- We condemn communication that degrades individuals and humanity through distortion, intimidation, coercion, and violence, and through the expression of intolerance and hatred.
- We are committed to the courageous expression of personal convictions in pursuit of fairness and justice.
- We advocate sharing information, opinions, and feelings when facing significant choices while also respecting privacy and confidentiality.
- We accept responsibility for the short- and long-term consequences for our own communication and expect the same of others.

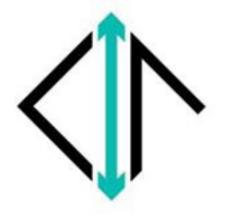
MEETING WITH JUDY GOLDRING

Representatives of the Central student unions met with incoming Governing Council Chair Judy Goldring, and Governing Council Secretary Louis Charpentier, secretary of the governing council. 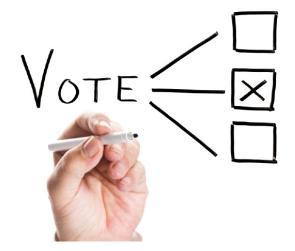
UCLIT BOARD MEETING PRESENTATION

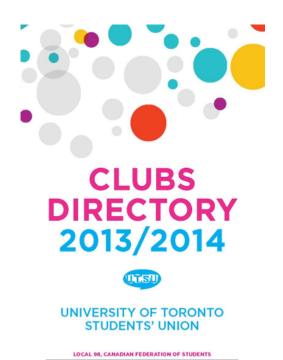
CELL PHONE CHARGING STATION

SUSTAINABILITY REPORT

Sustainability Commission Meeting

On August I2, the Sustainability Commission held its first official meeting of the year. At this meeting, this year's events were separated into six priorities: sustainable food, water conservation, environment & energy protection, sustainable transportation, EcoFest, and the facilitating of other groups' events which are to be determined. For a more detailed explanation of these priorities, please refer to the Sustainability Commission Budget Priorities 2013-14 file. A total budget of \$3500 was agreed upon and approved in principle to successfully execute this plan. The next meeting will be on Tuesday, September I7 at 5pm.

Sustainability Commission Collaborations

This month, the Sustainability Commission and Ben, the Sustainability Commissioner, were able to meet with a number of environmentally-focused campus organizations to discuss opportunities for collaboration. These meetings led to a number of great ideas for joint initiatives and events to be hosted this year. We look forward to working with these groups and other on-and off-campus organizations to create new sustainability campaigns and ensure the University of Toronto continues to adopt the most sustainable practices.

We will be working extensively with Toronto 350, a student-run group at UofT that strongly aligns with our goals and priorities. First, we will partner with them for a movie screening of 350.org's Do The Math documentary, help volunteer on the event day promote the event on campus. Next, Toronto 350 is creating a brief for the University of Toronto that presents an argument for divestment in fossil fuels. We will join in support of this case to help pressure the university to divest. Further events are in the preliminary planning stages.

The Sustainability Commission also plans to collaborate with the UofT Veg Club for several events. In accordance with the commission's sustainable food priority, we will work closely with the Veg Club to create events to educate students about the benefits of a more sustainable diet. We will help co-host a movie screening and vegan potluck where participants will share vegan recipes and watch the documentary Forks Over Knives. Further, we will co-host a vegan barbeque with vegan hamburgers and hotdogs.

The Sustainability Commission will also be working with one of our levy groups, BikeChain, to help us achieve our priority of more sustainable transportation by helping us with group rides as well as cycling seminars. We will promote the services of BikeChain to students and encourage cycling on campus through these events. Group rides will be held in the summer and winter to encourage year-round cycling.

DISCUSSION

So speaks to the administrative aspects of governance and emphasizes working with fellow students' unions to tackle issues regarding governance.

Ekpunobi asks So what she means by tri-campus initiatives.

So states the importance of events each campus holds and how important it is to not only collaborate for these events but also speak on initiatives when all campuses are present. She further highlights the importance of sister unions within the university.

Sajjad enters at 14:19.

Fan asks for clarification of the term Tri-Campus. He asks what affiliation Scarborough has with the UTSU.

Bollo-Kamara speaks to the affiliations existing with the UTSU and Scarborough Students' Union (SCSU). She further mentions that these collaborations, regardless of the affiliations, should be discussed with all three campuses.

So mentions that international students still do not have seats on Governing Council.

Emadi adds that this is also an issue that SCSU can relate to.

So speaks to the steps taken to decide the budget for the commission. She states that the commission was allocated \$9,000 according to the Unions' preliminary budget. She also mentions that the Board of Directors approved this in their initial board meeting.

Bollo-Kamara tells the commission that discussion at this meeting can be brought forward to the Board of Directors meeting, and will be open for discussion.

MOTION TO AMEND Moved: Sajjad Seconded: Ekpunobi

Be it resolved that the Academic and Student Rights Commission amend the proposed budget to include a \$300 Miscellaneous line item.

DISCUSSION

Sajjad explains to the commission that a miscellaneous fund is possible for other student initiatives that most likely will come up throughout the year.

Fan asks Sajjad how this amount was derived.

Sajjad mentions that it's a nominal figure that is not too big or not too small. He mentions that this number is subject to change.

CARRIED

So speaks to the Drop Credit policy and the new discussion paper in the work. She expresses her interest in advertising this new document in student newspapers to inform the general members.

Bollo-Kamara clarifies that this advertisement would take place as an article in the newspaper, highlighting what the Drop Credit Policy is and how it would benefit students.

So speaks to the Per-Course Fees and explains to the commission what the campaign is about. She speaks to her ideas regarding this campaign, mentioning awareness to new students as they are coming into their first year.

Bollo-Kamara highlights how outreach should be case-sensitively planned. She mentions that these funds go to target not only students but also administration, and the provincial government. She mentions that educate students should be the main focus of advocacy regarding these policies.

Jadidzadeh asks if this campaign is strictly an "Art's and Science" initiative.

Sajjad states that the investigation has expanded to professional faculties. He mentions that a lot of times, students in these faculties take Arts and Science courses and that emphasizes the importance of making this campaign flexible to faculties as well.

So discusses the professional faculty lunch and learns. She mentions that the UTSU will go to different faculties, providing lunch for students and discussing the different campaigns the union hopes to address, leaving the ground open for new ideas that the students may have.

Sajjad leaves at 15:01.

So speaks to the Academic Appeals guide she hopes to come up with. She wants to not only have a guide for students, but also provide them with a town hall. She hopes to invite administration to this town hall and allowing them to speak and answer questions to the procedures that registrars undergo in terms of academic petitions and appeals. So then speaks to Access Copyright.

Emadi speaks to the impact Access Copyright has on both undergraduate and graduate students.

MOTION TO AMEND Moved: Jadidzadeh Seconded: Ekpunobi

Be it resolved that the Academic and Student Rights Commission amend the proposed budget to increase Access Copyright to \$800.

DISCUSSION

Jadidzadeh states that more funds should be allocated to this initiative as to increase even greater awareness and build on the work that was started last year.

So speaks to the OHIP campaign for International Students. She mentions the importance of speaking towards individual student experiences.

Fan asks where the funds will go to for this campaign.

DISCUSSION

Bollo-Kamara highlights past events and the planning that was needed for them. She states that keeping the budget in minds in terms of planning each event is important. She mentions how we worked with different groups on campus to plan the Pride Picnic. She encourages the commission to come forward with any events they wish to plan.

Woerlein speaks about the Take Back the Night event that takes place on the evening of September 21^t

Bollo-Kamara states the importance of collaborating with different campus groups to host this event.

Saunders states that she would be interested in helping host this event with her background in Gender Equity studies.

Bollo-Kamara highlights past issues with the Men's Right event, where for example, a speaker spoke about the importance of having both a mother and a father as parents.

Woerlein summarizes the March Against Violence Against Women and Children.

Bollo-Kamara asks the commission about ideas anyone has regarding the future events.

She wishes to allocate \$3,000 for these events.

eXpression Against Oppression

Bollo-Kamara highlights previous events that have taken place with this XAO including self-defense classes, lunch and learns, and anti-oppression seminars. She urges the commission to come up with ideas for events regarding racial oppression. She also mentions previous XAO speakers including Rubin Carter, a man who was wrongfully accused and sentenced for murder in the United States.

Bollo-Kamara wishes to allocate \$2.500 for this event.

Film Screenings

Bollo-Kamara states that movie screenings have taken place outside the UTSU Office. She states that a member was interested in seeing the movie: "The Girl Rising." Bollo-Kamara states that the film screenings could take place between mid to late August or even September due to weather-related issues. She states that film screenings attract members and brings attention to the campaigns. She hopes to allocate 1,000 dollars for this event.

Symss states that she could speak to people in Health Studies and Human Biology.

5. CAMPAIGNS

MOTION Moved: Bollo-Kamara Seconded: Wathey

Be it resolved that \$750 be allocated in the Social Justice and Equity Commission budget to the Mental Health campaign.

DISCUSSION

Bollo-Kamara summarizes main points from the last Mental Health Committee Meeting, where students were concerned about counselors, scheduling difficulties, and overall structural problems with the university.

Lee states that we were also talking about writing a grant to the Ontario government regarding more funding for CAPS.

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Bollo-Kamara speaks about negative experiences with CAPS, including long wait times for appointments, assigning students to psychiatrists before counselors.

Fan asks if CAPS services are covered by the University of Toronto Health & Dental Plan.

Wathey states that members only have access to 20 sessions throughout their undergraduate degree, and mentions how international students are not covered by this plan.

Bollo-Kamara states that a campaign like this is sensitive, and that a method should be thought of where students can come forward with these ideas in confidentiality.

Simpson asks how we can access the proposal CAPS has presented. She states that Queens University has come up with a student initiative where they set up a province-wide phone line.

Emadi states the importance of introducing and familiarizing students with Accessibility Services. She states that it is important for new and existing students to know how to sign up for these services.

Bollo-Kamara states that we need to look at wider structural issues that affect students and levels of stress, such as flat fees, which affect all students. She states that our University does not have a fall reading week; but that we only have a day or two off.

Wathey mentions that Trent University implemented an additional few days for their fall reading week, due to high stress levels and elevated instances of suicide amongst students.

Bollo-Kamara states that these services are important for all students. She states that these campaigns all coincide with one another, helping students at the university to better fit with the structural difficulties.

Be it resolved that \$750 be allocated in the Social Justice and Equity Commission budget to the Gender Equity campaign.

Bollo-Kamara speaks about having educational events geared towards Gender Issues around campus. She states that last year, there was an event allowing students to speak about what feminism means to them.

Be it resolved that \$3,000 be allocated in the Social Justice and Equity Commission budget Collaborative Initiatives.

Bollo-Kamara speaks about Queer Orientation and the Ally Night. She states that the commission can have a say in how they want this event to take place this year. She states that it is important to have this event in a room where food is allowed, since it is an evening event. She hopes to have space in the budget for potential collaborations.

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6. NEW IDEAS AND INITIATIVE

DISCUSSION

Transitional Year Programme

Bollo-Kamara summarizes problems the TYP program is facing, including the lack of funding offered by the University. She states that the University intends to transfer the TYP to the Woodsworth College building.

Bollo-Kamara speaks about a potential event that would include speakers from marginalized groups such as members of the TYP and Idle no More.

Leduc-Robert states that for XAO, a possibility could be to include discussion on the prison industrial complex. They state that we can use this as an opportunity to plug in and/or invite outside organizations, such as the one that sets up pen pal systems where students can write to prisoners.

Lee states that we would like to see more events and town halls geared towards mental health. He states that he would hope to see motivational speakers, CAPS counselors, and potential speakers involved in this.

Simpson states that student confessions would be a good way of breaking down walls between students and help address isolation, whether in the form of poems, confessionals, and/or art.

So states that we could have an 'open-call' and educate members on the experiences of their fellow students.

Lee mentions that Club's Day is a great place for this to occur.

Emadi states that due to the nature of Orientation and Club's Day, a message board would be ideal. She mentions that a board with student messages could be both a creative and innovated way to create a safe space for this initiative.

Simpson asks about Green Dot and the motive behind their campaign.

Bollo-Kamara summarizes what Green Dot does. She mentions the No Means No Campaign the Union promotes.

Simpson expresses her interest in contacting Green Dot and doing a possible collaboration with them.

Bollo-Kamara states that she would be interested in creating new materials for the No Means No campaign, particularly for Orientation.

Wathey states that we could have a Q&A event geared towards mental health campaigns versus movie screenings.

So states that we could also try bringing in professors and faculty to these townhalls and events as guest speakers.

Emadi states that this may be particularly useful when dealing with perspectives on teaching at Con Hall versus smaller classes.

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Bollo-Kamara mentions that faculty are often useful resources to these campaigns, having been around for many years and having experiences many different kinds of teaching situations.

Bollo-Kamara speaks about the importance of informing students what it means to be an "Ally."

8. ONLINE VOTING

Hudson gives an overview of research that has been done with online voting she states that the union is waiting for the administration to get back to us on the usability of an online voting system called Simply Voting that provides online voting services to several students' unions including the University of British Columbia Alma Mater Society and the Students' Society of McGill University.

Hudson states that the elections could be run online in the fall pending the administration's response.

Coleman asks if we can get demographic information using Simply Voting.

Hudson states that she will ask.

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Coleman asks what type of scrutinizing capabilities will be available.

Hudson states that it is likely that the scrutinizing process would just involve a printout of how students voted. She states that it is difficult to have more detailed scrutinizing with an online process.

9. POLLING LOCATIONS

Hudson suggests extending the amount of polls and placing a poll at UTM.

Warnica suggests placing a poll at the Bahen Centre to get more engineering constituents.

Phan suggests placing a poll at the Medical Sciences Building.

Warnica suggests placing a poll at Gerstein instead of Medical Sciences.

Bollo-Kamara suggests placing a poll at the Davis Building.

Coleman suggests placing an additional poll at UTM.

Bollo-Kamara suggests placing an additional poll at CCIT.

Warnica asks if there should be a polling location in each Faculty that is having an election.

Phan states that nursing students can vote at Gerstein. She suggests that a polling location be added for Dentistry.

Coleman states that if a polling location cannot be secured at St. Michael's College then a location should be added at Victoria College.

Bollo-Kamara states that a polling location at Brennan Hall should be preferred over Alumni Hall because it has more student traffic.

10. OTHER BUSINESS

Coleman suggests that a discussion be had on how to ensure members are better informed on elections procedures.

Wathey states that he would like to have a policy townhall in the fall so members can get more information on the electoral process.

Coleman suggests that there should be separate townhalls at Trinity College and the Faculty of Engineering.

Bollo-Kamara states that certain individuals of the membership should not be privileged over others and all members should receive this information.

Bollo-Kamara also suggests using Facebook and social media.

Coleman states that he has suggestions to make our elections better functioning, and that can address current concerns. He states that these amendments should happen over the year. He states that he is interested in implementing preferential, instant runoff voting. He gives an overview of instant run-off voting. He argues that instant run-off voting would represent student votes more accurately.

Bollo-Kamara states she has looked into preferential voting in the past. She states that the St. Michael's College Students' Union used to have a preferential voting system that they discontinued. She stated that it was confusing and that students generally ranked their votes randomly. She also stated that some students would be confused and only voted once, and then their vote would count for less than that of students who fully understood preferential voting. She states that mathematically, sometimes preferential voting does not work

Warnica states that in an ideal world, the electorate would be aware of all the candidates, but that is not the case for UTSU elections. He states that he is also concerned that this may disenfranchise students who are less aware. He states that if there were ballots in the election, it would make the elections more difficult.

Coleman states that we should discuss this at a later time when members have more time to talk. He states that providing students with more information should be the solution to random student voting.

Coleman states that there should be more candidate debates and forums. He states that it may increase involvement in the elections and media. He states that this would also increase accessibility. He states that this should be seriously considered for Spring 2014. He states that this is his priority. He states that this discussion could continue later when there is more time.

Wathey states that the candidates' debate is held online so that more people can access it. He states that many people who attend debates are already well informed and are there to support their candidates. He states that the Committee should consider whether or not more debates would actually increase voter turnout.

Coleman states that we could change the way the debates are carried out so that they can reach out to more students and are differentiated each time.

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Bollo-Kamara states that she agrees with Coleman that the debates could be more engaging and informative. She states that she is still concerned that more debates would not necessarily engage more students.

Warnica states that debates take students away from campaigning, which is the most effective way to outreach to students

Phan states that more debates would take up more time and energy when the best way to reach students is face-to-face. She states that any accessibility concerns are addressed by the debates being available online.

Wathey states that perhaps questions could be considered from students online.

Bollo-Kamara states that this is a good idea. She states that people have told her that they would have participated but could not attend. She states that students asking questions online could engage more.

Coleman states that it should be clarified that the CRO is able to loan money to candidates. He also states that the percentage of the vote that students are required to secure before being reimbursed for votes should be reduced. He also states that the ways in which director candidates prove financial need should be clarified.

Hudson states that the current way in which candidates demonstrate financial need is through requesting reimbursement. She states that the union works on an honour system in that regard. She further states that the CRO has typically loaned funds to any candidate who requests it. She states that there is a threshold for being reimbursed to ensure that students are actually intending to run and are active candidates and not attempting to commit fraud against the students' union. She states that the Committee voting members are more than welcome to adjust what that threshold should be.

Bollo-Kamara states that she agrees with the current threshold, but is open to suggestions. Bollo-Kamara further states that the financial processes for candidates should be clarified. She states that the CRO explained all these processes last year in the all-candidate's meeting.

Coleman states that clubs and groups should not be allowed to endorse candidates. He states that they could do so to gain personal benefits. He states that candidates should not be penalized for violating rules that they do not understand. He states that the Elections Procedure Code should be amended to reflect the use online voting. He states that there should be workshops given as to how to run campaigns. He states that the Appeals Committee should be reformed. He states that there should be further discussion on these matters over email.

Wathey states that he does not feel comfortable rushing this discussion. He states that a meeting should be arranged at a time when Coleman is in the city rather than having a discussion over Skype.

Priority 1 Governance

Rationale

This priority involves lobbying for more student representation and involvement in decision-making process at the University of Toronto. To save costs on this campaign, the commission will be working closely with the Graduate Students' Union, the University of Toronto Faculty Association, Association of Part-Time Undergraduate Students, the Scarborough Campus Students' Union and the University of Toronto Mississauga Students' Union. With the two new campus councils implemented at UTM and UTSC within the Governing Council this year, the commission will be communicating and working closely with the Scarborough Campus Students' Union and the University of Toronto Mississauga Students' Union to ensure that under this new structure student representation and involvement are secured.

The Commission will create relevant materials to educate our members about student representation in decision-making processes of the university, as well as materials for lobbying for more student seats and international student involvement in Governing Council.

Timeframe: All Year Budget: \$500

Priority 2 Drop Credit Policy

Rationale

The Drop Credit policy is an effort to introduce a targeted policy which will enable students to have academic flexibility and, in essence, remove the lowest mark from their GPA under certain conditions.

For this project, we will be lobbying the University and faculty departments to implement the policy. Resources will be required to create a second lobby document. This document will be adding on to research that has been done in the current discussion paper that was released last year. The Commission will work with UTM and UTSC campuses and college registrars across the University of Toronto, as well as coordinating our campaign efforts with all interested students' associations. Resources are also required to produce educational materials like buttons to outreach to our members.

Timeframe: All Year Budget: \$500

Priority 3

Per-Course Fees

Rationale

On May 20, 2009, a flat tuition fee model was passed at Governing Council. This flat tuition fee model is to charge students a flat rate program fee for taking between three and six full credit equivalents (FCE). The flat fees system is problematic for students who are not able to afford to take a full course load due to financial or personal constraints and responsibilities. It also creates unnecessary stress on students and may prevent students with financial difficulty from engaging in campus activities. It is important to educate and our members, especially incoming students, on the flat tuition fee model.

The Commission will produce materials like buttons and flyers to educate members on this issue. There will also be a series of food sales to mock the current flat fees system as a creative way to educate our members on this issue.

Timeframe: All Year Budget: \$1500

Priority 4

Illegal Ancillary Fees

Rationale

Last year, an investigation on the ancillary fees being charged to all students was started by the central students' unions. The Scarborough Students' Union, Graduate Students' Union and University of Toronto Students' Union submitted reports highlighting many fees that were found to be in contravention of the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities' protocol on ancillary fees.

This year, the Commission will continue to raise awareness of these illegally charged fees to students. During the professional faculties lunch and learn sessions, a teach-in presentation will be included as a way to educate members on this issue and highlight some ancillary fees that are charged to the respective constituency. An open online reporting system will also be developed for students to report problematic ancillary fees that they are facing. Materials like buttons, posters and flyers will be produced for this campaign.

Timeframe: All year Budget: \$1500

Priority 5

Food Services

Rationale

For years, corporations such as Chartwells, Sodexo, and Aramark have held monopolies over campus food services, which has resulted in a lack of healthy and affordable food options on both the St. George and UTM campuses.

The Commission, adopting the suggestion from our members last year, will work closely with residence councils on campus this year. In particular, small town halls will be held to address residences that have mandatory meal plans and food services that are provided by corporation that have a long-term contract with the University during the first semester. Another town hall will happen during the second semester to integrate the comments collected in the first series of town halls to reflect and suggest recommendations to the University. Resources are required for promotional materials for the town halls.

Timeframe: All year Budget: \$1000

Priority 6

Academic Appeals Guide

Rationale

Students often find it confusing and difficult to follow the academic appeal process especially guidelines and rules can be different within divisions. Also, the process and ruling time of an appeal or filing a petition can usually be lengthy and causes additional stress for students. The Academic Appeals Guide aims to be a centralized resource to provide members with information on the process to appeal and file petition. It will also include resources on campus where members can get assistance and seek consultation from when going through the academic appeal processes. A town hall will happen prior to the production of the guide to provide members a chance to discuss their concerns and comments on the current appeal process at the University.

The cost of this priority will fall mainly on the printing on the guide itself and promotional materials for the town hall.

Timeframe: All year Budget: \$1800

Priority 7

Access Copyright

Rationale

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In January 2012, the University signed a licensing agreement with an organization called Access Copyright without the consultation of students, faculty or librarians of the University. The agreement claims that it will protect the university from being liable to infringement of the Copyright Act. With this agreement, each student would pay another \$26 fee for a same protection for which student used to pay only \$3.38. Additionally, the protections this licensing fee claims to provide students is provided free of charge by virtue of the fair dealing exception in copyright law.

This year on June 7, the University notified the campus community that it would not renew the license agreement it had signed with Access Copyright. However, the University left open for negotiation to Access Copyright for another license agreement. The Commission will work closely with other sister unions to lobby for the university to stop renewing and signing another contract with Access Copyright. The Commission will also work closely with the library committee to look into alternative paths of dealing with accessing copyrighted work.

Materials will be needed to educate and promote this campaign to our members.

Timeframe: All year Budget: \$800

Priority 8

OHIP for International Students

Rationale

Last year, the discussion around OHIP for international students was received very positively with the University. Currently, international students are covered by the University Health Insurance Plan (UHIP) which is provided by a private insurance company in which it is compulsorily charged to international students. However, many international students face difficulties and barriers in accessing health care services with UHIP, even though they pay for the coverage.

This year, the commission will be working on releasing a letter with the University to show support for this campaign. The Commission will also be working on conducting research to produce a myth and fact sheet to educate our members on UHIP and reflect the current status of international students. An online form will also be created to collect personal experience from our members of barriers and difficulties that they are facing under UHIP coverage.

Timeframe: All year **Budget**: \$1000

Priority 9

Miscellaneous

Rationale

This item is created from the commission as a means of funding to allow allocation for campaigns and projects that might come up throughout the year. This item also allows projects that fall short of fund to have room to reallocate and gain fund within the

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commission's budget itself rather than having to submit extra funding request to the Union.

Priority 1 disOrientation

Rationale

This is consistent with the Community Action Commission submissions over the past few years. disOrientation is a week of events co-hosted by the UTSU and the Ontario Public Interest Research Group Toronto as well as several other community groups and social justice groups at UofT.

This year's disOrientation focuses on global issues and injustices that many communities have been facing at home and abroad. This year's line of workshops include discussions on gendered violence, the problematic issues surrounding Men's Rights Groups at UofT, Queer Organizing, Women in Activism and finally a keynote speech by Sarah Schulman entitled: "How Change is Made in the Palestine/Israel Conflict."

The UTSU will help organize a workshop on free education.

The funds proposed from the Commission have been earmarked to help with the creation of promotional material, facilitation of workshops and other costs associated with hosting the various events during the week.

Timeframe: September, October

Budget: \$750

Priority 2 Task Force on Education

Rationale

The Taskforce on Education is a proposed initiative by the Commission in order to begin local dialogue from the UofT community in an effort to tackle the issues around the inaccessibility of post-secondary education. The UTSU is already participating in the Canadian Federation of Students-Ontario campaign 'The Hikes Stop Here', where we will be petitioning our membership in opposition to the recent framework announcement that tuition fees with increase from three to five per cent over the next four years. The materials for that campaign will educate our members about the provincial context, while the Taskforce will be catered to localized research about UofT. The primary members of this Taskforce would be students. We are also hoping to involve workers, faculty members, administrators and governors which will add to the depth of the Taskforce.

The proposed amount will be set aside for relevant promotional materials, event hosting costs, and meetings that will be held throughout the year.

Timeframe: All Year

Budget: \$750

Priority 3

Pedestrianize St. George Street

Rationale

This is an ongoing campaign of the UTSU to create more communal space that our student groups, societies, council, unions and members at large can take advantage of for hosting events and creating a more spirited campus in the heart of a very decentralized, urban campus. The work last year brought forward relevant research and conversations from our Town Hall on Pedestrianizing St. George Street. This year, the Commission's focus is to encourage more student involvement in the campaign and facilitate a dialogue in the city, university and with relevant campus groups to settle on a vision and operation of a pedestrian-only street from College to Harbord.

The Commission will produce materials like buttons and flyers to educate members on this issue. Some ideas from students came included using our very popular Street Festival during UTSUFest to have students sign declarations demanding street closures.

Timeframe: All Year Budget: \$1250

Priority 4

Transit Campaign: We Ride: Greater Transit Access (GTA)

Rationale

The vast majority of our membership commutes to campus. Students who live outside the downtown core of Toronto are commuting from Oakville, Brampton, Mississauga, North York, Scarborough, Milton, Ajax, Whitby, Pickering and many other regions and municipalities in the GTA. Many students are paying into several transit authorities every day in order to make the commute to campus. Coupled with the rising costs of education, unaffordable transit is a critical piece that must be addressed in our efforts to make post-secondary education more accessible. This campaign is targeted at students across the GTA, all of our campuses and at all colleges and universities in the region. It is being organized with the support of the Canadian Federation of Students-Ontario. A survey, paper and online, has been created along with many other materials including buttons, flyers and posters.

The funds proposed from this commission are largely to host membership-driven events and survey drives. Creating a Commuter Awareness Week has been proposed as a way to promote discussion and education.

Timeframe: All year Budget: \$1000

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Priority 5

Sweatshop Free Swag

Rationale

Several years ago, the UTSU successfully lobbied UofT to undertake a sweatshop-free policy in their purchasing and production of UofT apparel. As this was some time ago, we have noticed a lack of awareness within the membership at UofT about the necessity of ethical purchased apparel and products. The UTSU is proudly following its own policies to ethically purchase products for Orientation week and products throughout the year. This is a campaign that will look to educate the UofT community and student groups in ethical practices. Materials such as posters, flyers, buttons will be created as well as hosting student group workshops on ethical purchasing standards.

Timeframe: All year Budget: \$750

Priority 6

Responsible Investment

Rationale

The University of Toronto has an annual operating budget of \$1.7 billion and students are concerned about how these funds are procured and invested. This initiative focuses on research, education and hopes to promote discussions throughout our membership to talk about the history and current practices behind investors into the university. Barrick Gold, a company who indirectly contributes to the University of Toronto on a regular basis through its founder Peter Munk, has been notable for its human rights abuses. This campaign will require research into the University's policies surrounding donors and investments. Creating materials such as flyers and posters for educational events and general awareness strategies will be necessary. If Freedom of Information requests will be needed to undertake of confidential university documents, these funds will also be allocated to pay for those administrative costs.

Timeframe: All year Budget: \$750

Priority 7

Unpaid Internships

Rationale

Towards the end of the 2012-2013 academic year, the UTSU released an open letter to the Minister Yasir Naqvi voicing concern regarding the ongoing exploitation of youth and students through the practice of illegal unpaid internships in Ontario. This letter brought much publicity and media to the issue as news outlets and community groups were calling on the UTSU to be a leader among students regarding the issue. We have since been liaising with the Minister of Labour Yasir Naqvi about the issue. Our next steps are to build a coalition and work with not just student unions, but labour unions and a new group known

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as the Canadian Interns Association. Working hand in hand with these various groups, the UTSU wishes to create materials, host fora and events to increase member awareness and encourage our members report companies are violating the Employment Standards Act through the use of unpaid internships.

Timeframe: All year Budget: \$1250

Priority 8 Indigenous Solidarity

Rationale

Last year, the UTSU passed a motion to work in solidarity with various indigenous and First Nations groups in endorsing the Idle No More movement. In an effort to educate our membership, the Commission has proposed we host a very popular speaker who can speak to the injustices and attacks against the First Nations people of Canada. We are hoping to collaborate with community groups and student groups in hosting this event to discuss First Nations Rights and environmental justice.

Timeframe: All year Budget: \$850

Priority 1 eXpression Against Oppression

Rationale

The Social Justice and Equity Commission hosts eXpression Against Oppression Week in both the fall and winter semesters in collaboration with a number of groups on campus. XAO is a series of events that include workshops, movie screenings, group discussions on relevant topics and at least one high-profile speaker. Last year's keynotes were indigenous environmental justice activist Winona LaDuke and Rubin "Hurricane" Carter, who was involved in the civil rights movement in the United States and is known for being a former world-class boxer who was wrongfully convicted of murder. Resources are required for outreach and promotional materials, keynote speaker fees, and event logistics.

Timeframe: Fall and Winter Semesters

Budget: \$2500

Priority 2 Gender Equity

Rationale

Members of this Commission identified work on gender equity as a priority this year, particularly in the context of last year's concerns regarding a "men's rights" movement forming on campus and targeting women students and allies. The Commission seeks to provide space for students to discuss gender issues and ways to combat sexism on campus. The Sexual and Gender Diversity Office and the student group Feminist Engagement with Men and Masculinities are identified as potential collaborators for events. Resources will largely be allocated toward event logistics and outreach materials.

Timeframe: Throughout the year

Budget: \$750

Priority 3 Participation in Community Events

Rationale

The Commission strives to create opportunities for students to participate in community events and meet other students who are interested in doing the same. This includes

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recognizing and celebrating Pride on campus through this year's second annual Pride Picnic, and building a float for the Toronto Pride Parade. Commission members would also like to organize a UofT contingent for Take Back The Night, and participate in the AIDS Walk for Life. Resources are required for outreach and promotional materials, food for preand post-events and the cost of building a float for the Pride Parade.

Timeframe: All year Budget: \$3000

Priority 4

Collaborative Initiatives

Rationale

The Commission would like to collaborate with on-campus partners on a number of social justice and equity-related events that happen annually and is also interested in new ideas for collaboration. This includes planning Ally Night as part of Queer Orientation, and events like the Trans Week of Remembrance, the National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women. This also allows the Commission flexibility to work with other equity-seeking groups about other issues not specifically named here. Resources will largely go toward event logistics and outreach and promotional materials.

Timeframe: All year Budget: \$3000

Priority 5

Film Screenings

Rationale

This includes initial outdoor film screenings for August and September and then indoor screenings at various locations on campus, followed by group discussion. This is an opportunity to engage new people in the Commission and collaborate with groups to focus on relevant issues. Resources are required to acquire film rights, and for snacks and beverages for participants.

Timeframe: All year Budget: \$1000

Priority 6

Mental Health

Rationale

Mental health is an issue that affects many students, especially due to concerns with Counseling and Psychological Services. This initiative involves working with a number of students and groups to identify concerns and come up with solutions to improve services and support for students on campus. It also includes a campaign to destigmatize mental illness and ensure students have the resources to seek help if they need it. Resources are largely required for creating materials for outreach, but can also go toward supporting any events or initiatives that will further the stated goals of this campaign.

Priority 1 Sustainable Food

Rationale

The Commission intends to raise awareness of sustainable food practices such as vegetarianism and veganism as well as promote locally grown foods, organic foods, and cruelty-free foods. Further, it will promote these practices on campus through events and education.

- i. In partnership with the UofT Veg Club, the Commission will host a movie night and potluck where attendees will learn about the health-related issues with modern animal products as well as the environmental ramifications of producing them. Movie will likely be Forks Over Knives. Each attendee will be encouraged to cook and share a vegan of vegetarian meal to show the diversity and deliciousness of non-animal food. Resources needed to provide snacks and beverages. Event will be held at the end of September.
- ii. In partnership with Dig In! Campus Agriculture, the commission will continue the upkeep of the Equity Garden. The budget will allow for new topsoil and several new plants if they are needed. A gardening day will occur where volunteers can drop in and help maintain the garden. The rain barrels will be used for watering the garden.
- iii. The success of Hot Yam! will be continued through advertising and volunteer work by the Commission.
- iv. Following the success from last year, the vegan barbeque will return this year to encourage non-animal food alternatives. Resources used to purchase food and drink for the event. The Commission will consider alternatives to paper and plastic cutlery and dishes.

Timeframe: All Year Budget: \$550

Priority 2 Water Conservation

Rationale

The Commission intends to promote sustainable water usage, especially on campus. Now that plastic water bottles are banned on campus, it is important to reduce tap water waste and continue towards more sustainable practices.

i. The Commission intends to repeat last year's Residence Challenge event, where residences on campus compete against each other to have the lowest water consumption per capita during one month. There may be a chance for collaboration with campus groups working on water consumption awareness. Resources are needed to produce educational and outreach materials, and to provide a prize for the winning residence. The prize could be money towards a party or an environmental project of the

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residence's choice.

ii. A movie screening, specifically advertised to participating residences, will teach students the importance of water conservation to help encourage better performance in the Residence Challenge. Movie is to be determined. Resources needed to provide snacks and beverages.

Timeframe: January - March

Budget: \$550

Priority 3

Environment and Energy Protection

Rationale

The Commission intends on planning events to ensure a sustainable energy future. More specifically, we will focus on initiatives that will educate students about non-renewable resources and non-sustainable corporate behaviour.

- i. In partnership with Toronto 350, we will help advertise and facilitate a screening of 350.org's Do The Math documentary on the importance of reducing carbon emissions. The screening will take place at the Bloor Cinemas and has already been well planned. Elizabeth May will speak at the event that will take place on October 15. Since the event is already well planned, the Commission will focus on advertising the event throughout campus. The cinema can hold 700 people and will have 2 screenings. Resources will be needed for advertising materials.
- ii. In partnership with Toronto 350 and possibly the UofT Environmental Action group (UTEA), the Commission will facilitate and actively engage in pressuring the University of Toronto to divest its resources in fossil fuels. Toronto 350 is currently finalizing a briefing that will be mailed to the University that will force the University to officially address the issue. The Commission will circulate this briefing to faculty, staff, and students to raise awareness of the issue and help grow support of the campaign. Following this, the Commission will gather support for a rally to put pressure on the University to divest from fossil fuels. Resources will be needed for educational materials, advertising, and rally support.
- iii. The Commission intends on protesting Barrick Gold, a mining company causing ethical concerns and environmental damages. There may be a chance to partner with the Indigenous Environmental Network for letter writing and rallying against this company. More details are to come.
- iv. The Commission will work towards conserving paper throughout the University by starting a campaign to ensure all paper used on campus is printed double-sided. As a first step, the Commission will write a letter addressing all faculty to consider a strict double-sided policy for essay and assignment submissions.

Timeframe: All Year Budget: \$450

Priority 4

Sustainable Transportation

Rationale

The Commission intends on encouraging more sustainable transportation on campus, including increasing active transportation (e.g., walking, cycling) and developing more sustainable transit alternatives. As the University of Toronto is located in one of the largest cities in North America, it is important to be one of the leaders in reducing emissions from motorized vehicles and developing

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programs for safe alternatives such as cycling.

- i. The Commission will host 2 summer bike rides in an attempt to familiarize students with cycling on and off campus. Both rides will require resources to pay for food and beverages. There may be a possible partnership with BikeChain. The first ride will take place in September or October and focus on recreational cycling in Toronto. The second ride will focus more on navigating Toronto streets for commuting and will take place in October or November.
- ii. The Commission intends on partnering with BikeChain to hold a winter cycling seminar. The goal is to teach every level of cyclist how to bike in all weather conditions. Resources are needed for snacks and beverages.
- iii. Following the winter riding seminar, the Commission intends on hosting a winter group ride. This will give students experience riding in cold or wet weather and encourage active transportation throughout the second school semester. We intend on purchasing rain ponchos for all those involved in the ride as incentive to come to the event and continue cycling in the winter. Hot chocolate and coffee are also to be served.
- iv. The Commission intends on promoting the use of the PRESTO card since it is a sustainable and inexpensive alternative to exact change or tokens. We would like to purchase a few PRESTO cards to give away as part of a prize during EcoFest or other UTSU events.

Timeframe: All Year **Budget**: \$600

Priority 5

EcoFest

Rationale

The Commission intends on continuing the success of last year's EcoFest. EcoFest will include a week of activities, including The Amazing Eco Race, a competition between teams across campus to learn about sustainability. More details are to be determined.

Timeframe: September - October

Budget: \$600

Discretionary Budget

Rationale

The Commission intends on working closely with other sustainable and environmental groups throughout the University of Toronto and will include a budget for future events and initiatives that coincide with its goals.
